YORK, Maine — The Young Entrepreneurs Academy is entering its second season and is reaching out to Greater York Region Chamber of Commerce members to help make students' business dreams a reality.

The academy is a school-yearlong program, starting Oct. 30, that hones students' entrepreneurial ideas into firm business plans. At the end, an investors panel chooses the best business plan and helps to fund it.

"We expect them to treat it much like an after-school job," said YEA leader Amanda Stevens. "We really want students who have a heart for it. It could be a passion or hobby they like to do." The chamber runs the program founded by the University of Rochester in New York. The chamber ran it for the first time last year, making at least a threeyear commitment.

The deadline for students to apply is Oct. I for the first class, which starts Oct. 30. Classes are from 3 to 6 p.m. each Tuesday

during the school year until June at Traip Academy in Kittery. Applications are still coming in for this year, Stevens said.

The program takes up to 24 students in Grades 9-12 from York, Kittery, Eliot and the Berwicks. Students may attend public or private school or be homeschooled. If more than 24 apply, there will be a screening process, Stevens said.

In some cases, a student's business startup plan can help earn money for college, she said. Stevens has lined up speakers, field trips and program sponsors, such as Best Western of York and Warren's Lobster House. Business people who have volunteered to speak, be a mentor or open their businesses to a field trip include Andrew Siegel of When Pigs Fly, Barbara Parton of Advocate Consulting, Wendy Tapley of Tapley Insurance, accountant William Friberg, Alden Turner of the U.S. Small Business Administration, and Ann Peterson of Ann-imals Pet Supply.

Stevens is still looking for mentors and student-participant sponsors. She knows of one local high school student who would like to attend the program, but who can't afford it, she said.

"For some of these students, this is an opportunity of a lifetime," she said. York and Kittery schools cover the cost for their students, but others can't, she said. The cost is \$295.

Last year, YEA had seven students. The investors panel chose Aly York, now a York High School senior, as having the best business plan for her cupcake business, Frosted Canvas Bakery. York asked for and received \$300 in start-up funds. She also was able to work out of a licensed kitchen with a local baker, selling cupcakes wholesale to the Daily Grind, a business owned by David Woods, a member of the investors panel, Stevens said.

York also went to the University of Rochester in a fully funded trip to compete against students nationwide for a chance to win a \$30,000 scholarship to the university.

The Census is Coming!

The Economic Census is the U.S. Government's official five-year measure of American business and the economy. It is conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, and response is required by law. Published data cover more than 1,000 industries at the national and local level, 15,000 products and services, every state, every county, 10,000 cities and towns, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Island Areas. As part of the U.S. Census Bureau's mission to measure America's economy, this Economic Census covers the year ending December 2012.

Economic Census Facts:

• More than 4 million employer businesses will receive Economic Census forms between October and December, 2012.

• Response is required by law. Responses are confidential. (Title 13, U.S. Code)

• Companies will receive industry forms tailored to their size and primary business activity.

• Businesses can report electronically. For the first time, small businesses will have a web form to complete online.

• Businesses will find answers to most questions at econhelp.census.gov starting in Fall 2012.

Why an Economic Census?

• Federal agencies rely on Economic Census data as the basis for key measures of economic activity, such as Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and monthly retail sales.

• State and local agencies use the data for economic development and regional planning.

• Trade and business associations and chambers of commerce use Economic Census data to report key business facts and for economic development and business decisions.

• Businesses use Economic Census data to support business decisions and planning, such as identifying potential markets for growth, starting a new business, evaluating location and investment decisions, and applying for a loan.



In its 28th year, **Harvestfest** is a two-day event located at beautiful Short Sands Beach, in York, Maine.
