Anthony's 350-mile bike ride challenge

A CAMBRIDGE man who has battled a rare nerve disorder is taking on 350-mile cycle challenge to raise awareness of the condition.

Anthony Brown, of Perse Way, Arbury, is embarking on the ride with Martin Willitts, from Cambridge, and Anthony's brother-in-law Steve Ramsay, from Preston, to also raise money into research of Charcot-Marie-Tooth Disease (CMT). They will set off on

The 39-year-old and his brother Matt Dettmar, 34, were diagnosed with the disease as teenagers and Anthony had to undergo a series of operations between the ages of 14 and 21 to reconstruct his tendons.

CMT results in poor transmission of nerve signals and muscle withering, which causes the loss of fine motor control and makes day-to-day activities like walking difficult.

Anthony said: "CMT has been with me for as long as I can remember. It started to affect me in my teens as I had 'foot drop', which meant I strugg-led to lift my feet.

"This gradually got worse as I got older and when I reached my 30s I started to lose the sensation in my

"I like to set myself challenges each year and decided to do the ride to raise awareness of the disease.

"It is going to be difficult but I'm looking forward to it."

Anthony hopes the ride will raise £9,000 for CMT UK - it also ties in with the charity's first awareness

The three cyclists will be supported by Matt Dettmar and Nic Dent, who will be driving supplies between

Along the route they will take in key locations in CMT's discovery.

These include St John's College, Cambridge, where Henry Tooth described the disease in his PhD dissertation, St Bartholomew's Hospital in London, where Tooth practised later as a doctor, and The Salpêtrière Hospital in Paris, where Prof Jean Martin Charcot and his student Pierre Marie published the first description of the disease.
