Uglies Book Review

Scott Westfeld has successfully created a masterpiece with his debut book, <u>Uglies</u>, This book has been presented with many honors and has two successful sequels. The book begins in a post-apocalyptic world, after the downfall of the "Rusties" (21st century). We meet Tally Youngblood--a seemingly ordinary fifteen-year-old just waiting to turn sixteen and to be transformed (by an operation) into a Pretty and be invited into their exclusive world. <u>Uglies</u> is very highly rated and in my opinion, deserves to be. At first, it may seem like a shallow book about becoming beautiful and downgrading the Uglies, but it really exposes the flaws of humankind.
