You have to provide the mother with a safe and quiet whelping box and a heating pad for nesting. You also have to feed the mom and keep her exercised. You have to give the mother love, keep her healthy, and keep her looking over her puppies. For the puppies themselves, you have to socialize them and teach them how to walk with a collar and a leash, according to Williams.

Whether you have been fostering for a month or many years, you will have many opportunities to help an animal in need.

8th grade student/animal foster, Kellie Stahlhuth, answered, "Yes, it's nice to see puppies and kittens who wouldn't have been here without my help," when asked if she enjoys fostering.

"I have fostered over 100 dogs," said Williams, "in my 11 years of fostering."

Stahlhuth states: "I foster them at my home, but I get them from the Agoura

Shelter."

If you do not live next to the Agoura Animal Shelter, there are plenty of other great shelters around California and the country. For example: The Burbank Animal Shelter located in Burbank, CA, the West Valley Animal Shelter located in Chatsworth, CA, and the Animal Regulation Department located in Camarillo, CA.

These are all very good animal shelters scattered throughout the community.
