Straus Painting Needs Restoration Submitted by Betty Sherrill

With a slight kindly smile on his face, the portrait of Harry S. Straus hung over the fireplace in the Ecusta cafeteria for many years. Straus was the founder of Ecusta Corporation which made fine papers for cigarettes, Bibles, air mail envelopes and other utilizations.

As the demise of the paper mill approached a few years ago, Transylvania County Planner Mark Burrows was contacted by the local volunteers at the county's archives, to investigate the possibility of saving the Straus portrait and other historical photos from the plant. After Burrows spoke with David Poor, the last plant manager of the paper mill, the items were promised by Poor who stored them in his home until the opportunity to turn them over to the county's archives committee.

About that time the county's archives merged with the Rowell Bosse North Carolina History Room at the new Transylvania County Library. The portrait and photos were donated to the Transylvania Heritage Museum as a better repository for exhibit.

Restoration

Art restorers, Bill and Linda Muir of Muir Fine Arts, now have the portrait and are ready to rehabilitate both the portrait and the frame. "It's well painted and the frame is worth restoration, too" said Linda Muir. A condition report and proposed treatment will be filed, however two main needs are obvious. "There is a hole in the paint-

ing, which shouldn't be too hard to repair and repaint but the frame has numerous dings," explained Muir. The total costs are quoted as \$1,500 but \$250 being donated by the Muirs. Therefore \$1,250 must be raised before the work can begin.

A Mystery

Although there is a signature by the painter, it cannot be read. The Transylvania Heritage Museum would like to know when the Straus portrait was painted and who the artist was. Any other information such as when the painting was acquisitioned and how old Straus was at the time of the painting would be useful information to retain by the museum.

Memories

Former Ecusta employee, Ruby Sprouse, commented on Harry Strauss. When asked if Ecusta employees liked their boss, she said, "Oh yes, absolutely! Mr. Straus was admired by the employees. He was generous and good to us. He was also very involved in the community."

Current city councilman Mac Morrow also worked for Ecusta. He remembered that at one time, Straus' portrait was removed to a private office and a photo of Whiteside Mountain was hung over the cafeteria fireplace instead. "Everybody had a fit, " said Morrow. "They were very fond of him." The portrait was soon returned to its proper spot. "He did a lot for the people in this community," Morrow remarked

A Brief History

Hans Herman Straus, later known as Harry, had a relative in New York so he emigrated from Manheim, Germany in 1903 expressly to learn English. However, he married Martha Washington Landeck and decided to remain in America. He began working in sales for a cork and machine company and was unanimously elected president within five years. Straus biographer, Bryan duToit said, "(Straus) was a bright, hardworking young man and full of initiative." His position later led to work with the endless belt operations and the Peerless Rolled Leaf Co. When the company "went public" on the stock exchange, Straus ended up with the majority of the stock," said duToit

By 1912, Straus had bought a rotogravure printing company, then the OK Button Molds Manufacturing Co. and then the Franks Machine Co. which produced gold, straw, silk and wood veneer cigarette tips. There were also two other companies that he either owned or partnered. It was during this time that Straus became a naturalized citizen and began to use the name "Harry."

Straus wanted to become more involved in the tobacco business and started research on hemp and flax for cigarette papers in California. He searched the south for a plant location. Among his specific requirements were a site not in a major manufacturing area, but rather a small town with a highly employable population, a clean high volume of water and close proximity to a railroad.

Straus hired a research team from the University of North Carolina to help find an appropriate site. "After looking over 28 sites, the search narrowed down to four sites (all in western North Carolina) and Brevard was the eventual winner," said duToit.

After construction and operations begin in the late 1930s, the paper plant eventually employed 2,300 employees. With the addition of the cellophane division, total employees at the Ecusta site were over 3,000.

Community Involvement

As well as buying camp Sapphire as a recreation area for his employees and their families, Straus had interests in other county activities, especially music. He formed the Ecusta Band. Former band member Bobbie Sherrill Rimmer remember he bought everything. "He supplied the uniforms, the instruments and the teachers," she said. Straus also helped form the Brevard High School Band and was a great supporter of the Brevard Music Center. His comment was, "The music center is one of the greatest additions to the cultural life of Brevard. My support of (this) effort is the result of my observations of the wonderful work being done," Straus became a loval benefactor and trustee of the music center for many years.

Restoration Funding

In order for the Harry Straus portrait to be restored, The Transylvania Heritage Museum is asking for donations. "We need to complete this project by the time the summer season is fully open, perhaps early June, " said museum director Rebecca Suddeth. "There are a lot of former employees that are still faithful to the memories of Ecusta and many have remained close friends. We hope these folks will join together to save this important artifact that symbolizes the huge impact the paper mill had on our population and our history."
