GEORGE WASHINGTON'S CRANBERRY PUDDING

2 EGGS, BEATEN ★ 2 T SUGAR ★ PINCH SALT ★ 1/2 C MOLASSES ★ 2 TSP BAKING SODA
 1/3 C BOILING WATER ★ 1 1/2 C SIFTED FLOUR ★ 1 1/2 C CRANBERRIES, HALVED
 Combine eggs, sugar, salt and molasses. In a separate container, mix flour and baking soda. Add to egg mixture. Stir in flour and cranberries. Steam in a buttered rice steamer for 1 1/2 hours. Serve warm with the following RAVISHING SAUCE:
 2 sticks butter ★ 2 cups sugar ★ 1 cup half-and-half. Melt butter. Add sugar and half-and-half and stir until sugar is dissolved. Serves 6 to 8.
