FATHER BEN NELSON

Rector of All Saints' Church

Aloha Dear Ones,

Many of you have probably heard the song that reminds us of the wonderful passage from the third chapter of the book of Ecclesiastes:

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing; a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away; a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace.

The song, originally written by Pete Seeger and made famous in the sixties by The Byrds, is a fantastic reminder of the poetry and grace that can be found in scripture. We may never know who actually wrote the piece of scripture that inspired Seeger to set those words to music, but we can know the message that God delivers in the beautiful words written so long ago.

In my mind, this passage (and the entire book) remind us that God is present throughout the ages, and part of our responsibility as faithful people is to embrace the seasons that God graciously gives us in the precious time we have together. A good friend of mine loved to remind me that the preciousness of life begins with a breath and that our moments on earth are full of gifts to be thankful for... He also liked to say that when we forget that truth, we can be gently reminded that God knows our sitting down and our rising up, our inhales and our exhales.

As you and I begin a season of transition, I want to really be thankful for the wonderfully precious moments that I have had with you. Over the past three and half years, God has done amazing things with us and, when we pay attention, we can really see the wonderful gifts that have been given to us. A church full of people who seek to find Christ in one another and the world, a growing concern for the world outside our church doors, and a continuing spirit of hospitality that really makes a difference for those that cross our paths- for an hour, a day, or a season.

For the next few weeks, I want to work hard at sharing those wonderful joys with you so that we will continue to build on the success we've had together. There will be challenges ahead, but no more than we can handle. God continues to bless us and hold us safely in the palm of God's hand. No matter what the season, God is with us as sure as the Sun rises across the street from where we pray together on Sunday.

Thank you for what I have learned and thank you for the precious moments you have shared with my family and me. May God continue to bless us all!

Next on the agenda was the election of Vestry members. There were two positions open, one for a three-year term to replace outgoing member Janis Wright, and a two-year position to replace Jeff Santos, who had originally agreed to serve for a year. Brandon Williams was nominated and voted in for the three-year position, and Dianne Tabura was voted in for the two-year position with an agreement to serve for one-year. We welcome both members to the Vestry and look forward to another productive and exciting year ahead!

Convention delegates to this year's 44th Annual Meeting of Convention and Sesquicentennial Celebration in October, are Jean Nakamoto, Mary Margaret Smith, Janet Wilson and Mary Wilson, with alternates Mario Antonio and Mary Schulz.

Pam Sokei read the report for the Episcopal Church Women, recapping their productive year, followed by a report by Sybil Nishioka on Hale Lani Christian Store and Family Ministries. The Ke Akua Youth Group took a break from gardening duties to share their busy year for members.

Mary Smith presented a report on the Haiti Outreach Trip which included a video clip of Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori on-site in Haiti, encouraging continued support to the people of this country.

Treasurer Jan Hashizume presented the budget and was encouraged with the pledges that increased significantly over 2011. The budget, however, includes fundraising and also endowment fund transfers, although much lower than previous years.

He shared about the new projects coming up in 2012 such as the deck around the False Kamani tree, and also the regular maintenance of the church that is very challenging. David spoke about the the Hawaiian Service which continues to be a great worship event for the community, as well as other church events.

He also shared about the upcoming search process for a new rector beginning with a meeting with the Bishop in February, and the formation of a new Church Profile that will be used in the search process.

Fr. Ben gave the final Rector's report, encouraging us to remain welcoming and active after he is gone. He talked about the Church Profile from the search process that brought him here, and how much of it has been realized and the challenges that continue. The meeting was closed with a prayer and adjourned.

GROUND BREAKING ON THE PEACE GARDEN

Lacee and Jeff Santos' vision for a peaceful place for all in the community to enjoy, is coming closer to fruition. On Saturday, January 28, they broke ground on the Peace Garden, located along the stone wall next to the gym driveway entrance. Several members turned out to help with the initial work, where sections of grass were removed and benches assembled and stained.

After the second service the following day, the youth worked on the garden while adults attended the Annual Meeting in Church. Under the direction of Jeff and Lacee, they did a great job shoveling, raking and planting ti leaf and Stephanotis along the borders. Once the meeting was over, more folks joined in to help well into the late afternoon.

When completed, the garden will feature a large wooden cross engraved with the different names of our Lord. Gravel will be the main floor covering for most of the garden so that when people walk on it, "...it will sound like walking in snow," explained Jeff.

The Santos' obtained a grant to create this garden, but it was their intention to complete it months before the birth of their baby due in March. Although Lacee had planned to take a more physical role in the garden, the delays with the grant have limited her to supervisory duties... but she's it looks like she's got a lot of helping hands to see her vision come alive!

The garden still has a bit more to go, so stay tuned for information and dates when more work days will be taking place. Anyone is welcome to take part. LOS ANGELES HERE WE COME!

It's been a little over two years since the Ke Akua Youth Group started planning a trip that was originally intended to be a pilgrimage to Italy, then to Israel. It has since turned to mission and although the destination and focus have changed several times, this journey contains all the elements of a pilgrimage that require prayer, study, research, reflection and tons of fundraising!

The most wonderful thing so far, has been to see the spiritual growth and compassion that has developed in these young men and women, and this is directly reflected in the choice they made to go to Los Angeles.

After their return from the Episcopal Youth Event last summer, they were even more energized to help others. They reviewed several mission organizations and sites, including Indian reservations, the inner cities of San Francisco and San Diego, but the unanimous decision was Los Angeles.

The harsh facts about the City of Angels helped them to decide. Los Angeles contains over 90,000 homeless at any given time. In the 10-square block that comprises Skid Row (where they will be ministering to) there are 15-20,000 homeless. One-third to one-half are women and children.

The group will be working through a Christian organization called Center for Student Missions (CSM) that specializes in short term mission work for youth and adults. They are linked with churches and agencies in the inner cities that rely on volunteers to help them serve the community. While there, they will be working in soup kitchens, homeless shelters, and childcare and youth facilities while worshipping with other youth that have come together for the same purpose.

Eight of our youth have committed to participate. They are Alanna Bauman, Jannin and Joni Hashizume, Casey Nakamura, Shane Nishioka-Healy, Ty Shiramizu, Mick Voigt and Cassidy Yatsko. So far, the youth group has raised over \$10,000, that will help cover a large part of the costs. They will continue to fundraise until their departure at the end of June. Please keep them in your prayers as they prepare for this mission.

"Become closer to the Lord."

"I hope to get more questions asked about my faith while helping others."


