

133 Plantation Street

In April 2011, a triple-decker burned down, leaving 12 people homeless. Wells Fargo Bank donated the land to Habitat for Humanity – MetroWest/ Greater Worcester to build a duplex.

Each 3-bedroom home will be energy star certified. Two pre-qualified low-income families will be selected and will contribute 400–500 hours of “sweat equity” into building these two affordable homes.



Mission: Providing a Hand Up, Not a Hand Out!

Habitat for Humanity - MetroWest/Greater Worcester is a non-profit, ecumenical faith-based organization. Its credo is that every man, woman and child should have a decent, safe and affordable place to live. The duplex at 133 Plantation Street in Worcester will provide two families with stability and hope within their new lives. The results are life-changing. Habitat strengthens communities by helping families help themselves.

Building a House. Selecting a Family.

Volunteer labor and donated materials help make Habitat homes affordable. Homes are sold to partner families at a price based on their income.

We use 3 criteria in our family selection process:
1) need for adequate shelter,
2) ability to pay a monthly mortgage, and
3) willingness to partner with Habitat.



Importance of Sweat Equity.

Habitat builds houses *with* families, not *for* them. A typical Habitat home costs about \$150,000 to build. Partner families must contribute 400-500 hours building their own home or volunteering on another Habitat project.

Habitat Homes Strengthen Families and Community.

When Habitat helps families help themselves, the community gets stronger. With permanent housing, families break free from the cycle of poverty.



Habitat housing often has a stabilizing effect on families and motivates them to give back to their neighborhoods and community.
