

Starting this academic year, IPFW students are eligible to apply for the Junior Fellows Program at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

Each year, the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace holds a rigorous national competition to select approximately 8-10 graduating seniors to serve as research assistants on Carnegie Endowment projects. They are matched with senior associates – academics, former government officials, lawyers and journalists from around the world – to work on a variety of issues related to international affairs. Junior Fellows have the opportunity to conduct research for books, participate in meetings with high-level officials, contribute to congressional testimony and organize briefings attended by scholars, journalists and government officials.

Junior Fellows have the opportunity to work at the Endowment in Washington, DC for the period of one year and provide research assistance to scholars working on Carnegie Endowment's projects. This year the junior fellow positions are available in the following areas:

- Democracy
- Nuclear Policy
- Energy and Climate
- Economics - Economics background required.
- Middle East Studies - Native or near-native Arabic language skills essential.
- South Asian Studies - Applicants should be comfortable with quantitative data manipulation as well as possess an interest in military issues. Strong background in international relations, political theory or international political economy is essential. Note: foreign language skills not required.
- Southeast Asian Studies - Background in politics and economics of the region and knowledge of quantitative techniques a plus.
- Asian Studies - Mandarin Chinese reading skills a huge plus. Japanese language skills may be helpful.
- Russian/Eurasian Studies - Excellent Russian language skills required.

IPFW will nominate up to two outstanding candidates to the national competition. Students who wish to be considered for this program are chosen via an internal competition and then the applications of our nominees are forwarded to the Carnegie Endowment.

The Carnegie Endowment does not accept direct student applications for this award.

Junior Fellows spend one year (beginning August 1st) at the Carnegie Endowment in Washington, DC. Positions are full-time and include a salary (\$36,000/year) and benefits package.

To apply for the IPFW internal competition, students must first register with and pick up application materials from Ann Livschiz, Associate Professor in the Department of History (Liberal Arts 275). Those interested in applying should contact Dr. Livschiz (livschia@ipfw.edu) as soon as possible.

The deadline for submission of all materials for the internal competition is:

Friday, November 16, 2012 at 5:00 p.m.

Complete application packets must be delivered to the History Department Office (Liberal Arts 209).
