


From plant to animal, internal to external, parasites have explored all realms. See eye-popping snails (literally) and beautiful plants, the parasitic world has that and much more to offer.

Dr. Frances Berdan has authored or co-authored 14 books and more than 100 articles on Aztec and Colonial Mexican culture, economy, and society.

Ken Drummond & Ray Yeager


