Happy Trails to You

I know I'm going to date myself, but I remember watching the Roy Rogers Show. At the end of each episode, Roy Rogers and Dale Evans would sing, "Happy Trails to You." For me, this tune has come to signify trail use in general.

Whenever I use one of our local trails, I am struck by how pleasant trail users are and their overall demeanor. Most people acknowledge you with a smile and often a greeting. People using the trail seem to be in a genuinely good mood.

There has been a lot of research on the value of trails to people and communities. Quality of life is often cited when discussing the

benefits of trails. More recently, the impact trails have on health, stress reduction and cost savings for medical treatment has been studied.

These studies have found that people who use trails are healthier and tend to have lower health-related expenses. I know in my case, I feel better when I exercise and being on a trail in a natural environment makes me feel more relaxed. I tend to forget about the problems that are bothering me - at least while I'm on the trail. Sometimes the quiet relaxation even allows my mind to develop a solution to some of those perplexing, persistent problems. Trails are indeed good recreational opportunities with outstanding health benefits for trail users.

Trails are also increasingly being promoted as alternate transportation facilities. Using trails to commute to work or run errands becomes more popular as fuel prices increase. In addition, many people like using trails for the environmental benefits of not having to start the car and drive to their destination.



The Linn County Conservation Board has been a longtime supporter and advocate for trails. In the late 1970s, trail supporters envisioned the Cedar Valley Nature Trail as the backbone for a multi-county trail system in Eastern Iowa. It took a lot of work and many meetings, but eventually the Cedar Valley Nature Trail became a reality. Today, trails

have become an accepted and valued amenity.

The Happy Trails song signaled the end of the Roy Rogers show; however, with trails, we are not even close to the end. Trails are now an expected part of most communities. The Linn County Conservation Board, in partnership with the Board of Supervisors and other organizations, continues to work toward connecting people with destinations in the community.

Currently, the Board is involved in several trail projects. The Hoover Trail connecting the Cedar River Trail in Cedar Rapids south to Ely opened late this spring. A few minor construction details

still need to be completed, but the Hoover Trail officially opened on June 3 at a grand opening ceremony in Ely.

Work will begin this summer on a trail in Pinicon Ridge Park. This project involves connecting the park to Central City's trails. Part of this project involves crossing the Wapsipinicon River on the Mary Lundby Memorial Bridge to connect the park campgrounds to the day-use side of the park. The trail and bridge should be open for use in 2012.

The Cedar Valley Nature Trail continues to receive attention. A project to hard surface the trail from County Home Road to Shultz Road south of Center Point is underway. Engineering work is being completed now with plans to start the work next year. Hard surfacing allows the trail to be used during times of the year when the trail would otherwise be too soft. The short-term goal is to surface the trail through Center Point.

The Board is also working with the city of Marion to connect the Grant Wood Trail with Marion's new trail system. This connection will require an underpass of Highway 13. Engineering work will be starting in the near future with construction anticipated next year.

There are many other trail projects that are in various stages of planning and discussion. The Linn County Trails Association is an ongoing, active partner in helping coordinate local governmental bodies to complete needed trail projects and connections throughout the county.

As more and more trails are developed, increasing numbers of people will have the chance to use and enjoy trails near their homes. So we urge you to take advantage of the warm weather to enjoy a local trail. We are sure it will make you feel relaxed and rejuvenated. Happy trails to you!


