Dear Participant,

Welcome to International Red Panda Day 2011! If you participated in our inaugural awareness campaign last year, welcome back. If this is your first year of participation thank you for helping us spread the word about red pandas. Our goal for International Red Panda Day (IRPD) is to create as many Red Panda Rangers as possible on a single day around the world and raise the funding necessary to protect red panda in Nepal. Last year we raised \$5,000, which supports the protection of 3% of Nepal's red panda population, and created over 1,000 Red Panda Rangers.

A Red Panda Ranger is a special title given to children who learn and help spread the word about red pandas. To become a Red Panda Ranger, children will need to "travel" the five home country ranges of the red panda by completing at least 3 of the 5 games found in the attached participant packet.

Your participant packet contains everything you need to manage IRPD and help us create Red Panda Rangers. The packet will be available to download on our website at <http://redpandanetwork.org/get-involved/international-red-panda-day/>. There will be two packets available to download: one for educational participants (schools and community groups) and one for institutional participants (zoos). Please download the appropriate packet for your organization or group.

In addition to the activities, your participant packet includes an information sheet for future Red Panda Rangers and a press release statement for local media. Please feel free to use the press release with your local media to promote the campaign to your constituents. The information sheet can be handed out to participating children upon entry or wherever they will begin the activities. The sheet explains their task as they travel to each activity station and complete the challenges on their quest to become Red Panda Rangers.

For International Red Panda Day 2011, we envision children traveling the world as participants in the Red Panda Games, our version of the Olympics. We suggest spreading the activity stations throughout your zoo, school or community. We understand that this may not be feasible for every participant. Each participant will decide how best to organize the activities for their constituents.

Upon the completion of 3 activities, children will be awarded with a passport stamped with the 5 red panda home range countries and receive an official Red Panda Ranger Certificate (or Junior Forest Guardian Certificate for returning Rangers). We have provided you with a blank certificate for you to fill in each child's name. We kindly ask that you take down a list of all the new Rangers you create and take digital photos of each new Red Panda Ranger if possible. Please have their parent or guardian sign a completed Photo Release Form for Red Panda Network to use on our website and semi-annual newsletter, *Red Panda Times*. Please send the Ranger list and signed forms to **Red Panda Network, PO Box 868, Newark, CA 94560**.

Below you will find explanations of the games created for International Red Panda Day and the suggested age groups. You can choose to offer all of these activities or pick and choose the ones that best suits your needs.

Activity: Pandas in Peril Human Board Game (Age Group: All)

Directions: For complete instructions read the attached game sheet. Set up the game board as instructed. Participants will “become” red pandas and learn the challenges for survival in the wild as they travel around the game board collecting panda chips. Participants roll a dice to determine the number of spaces to travel, pick up any game cards they have landed on and follow the instructions on the card. The game ends when all the red pandas reach the end of the game board. Have each red panda discuss what their positive and devastating experiences were as they tried to survive the forest.

Hint: Print the game cards and panda chips on sturdy paper such as card stock paper or laminate them so they can be re-used in the future. Allow for generous space in between each game card so participants have to travel. If you like, you can reward the winning red panda that collects the most panda coins.

Activity: Firefox Fun Memory Card Game (Age Group: All)

Directions: Print doubles of each red panda image for the playing cards. Photocopy the fact sheet for the expected number of participants. Randomly place all cards face down in a large square or rectangle. Participants take turns to try and match 2 card images correctly. Doing so earns a red panda fact read out loud by the game host. At the end of the game, hand the fact sheet out to the participants to take away with.

Activity: Lost Little Firefox: An Interactive Tale by Leeza Hernandez (Age Group: All)

Little Firefox, is a red panda, who is super hungry and needs his breakfast, but what could it be? When he wanders off to look for food he finds himself lost! Join Little Firefox on his quest and help him return home with this interactive tale ... we mean tale! Each step of the way on Little Firefox's journey, readers will discover fun facts, meet new friends and learn all about Red Panda.

Directions: Designate a story teller to read the story. When the story teller comes upon a decision point, ask the listeners to vote on which direction they would like Little Firefox to take. The path the story takes depends on the choices of the listeners. An incorrect choice will result in starting the journey over. There will also be an online version of this activity available on our website.

Activity: Name that Animal Hunt (Age Group: All)

Directions: Participants will explore your facilities while spotting animals that share red panda habitat. Ask children to complete the activity hand out by naming and drawing 5 animals that live in the same region as red pandas (Nepal, China, India, Burma and Bhutan).

Hint: If you do not have exhibits featuring animals that share red panda habitat, you can provide a book for children to look up the information. Children can also look up this information online.

Activity: Red Panda Coloring Mask (Age Group: Elementary/Grade School children)

Directions: Ask children to color in the provided red panda face template. Assist young children with cutting out the colored mask. Punch holes on each side of the red panda face and tie with a string to create a mask or tape the mask to a stick.

Hint: Print the activity on colored paper for those not wanting to color the entire mask.

Join us, Mozilla Foundation and 50 zoos worldwide in a day of fun activities that will celebrate and educate the uniqueness of red pandas. This year's theme is the Red Panda Games. Children will "travel" around the world to compete in games from which they will learn different red panda facts and get their passport stamped. Our goal is to raise worldwide awareness about red panda, create as many Red Panda Rangers as possible on a single day, and raise the funding necessary to protect red panda in Nepal. Last year we raised \$5,000, which supports the protection of 3% of Nepal's red panda population, and created over 1,000 Red Panda Rangers.

Red Panda Network is committed to the conservation of wild red pandas and their habitat through the education and empowerment of local communities. Though the red panda and its habitat are endangered mainly due to livestock grazing, creation of agriculture fields and grazing pastures, firewood and fodder collection and road building, red panda are also known to be hunted for their beautiful skins and tails because their color is auspicious in some regions of their range. You can help by visiting one of the participating organizations or hosting your own red panda party at home, work or school on International Red Panda Day.

Dear Future Red Panda Ranger,

Welcome to International Red Panda Day – the world’s only international awareness campaign dedicated to red pandas. This is your opportunity to participate in our own version of the Olympic Games, the Red Panda Games, and become a Red Panda Ranger. If you are already a certified Ranger, you can become a Junior Forest Guardian. This is the first time we have offered this unique title!

What is a Red Panda Ranger?

A Red Panda Ranger is a special title given to children who help us spread the word about red pandas. Red Pandas are endangered in the wild. For example, the red panda population in Nepal will go extinct in 40 years if we do not do something to help them. However, most people have never heard of a red panda. We need your help to let other people know that red panda exist and that they are endangered.

How do you become a Red Panda Ranger?

You will be given the task of representing the home range countries where Red Pandas live: Nepal, India, China, Burma and Bhutan. To earn a red panda passport at the Red Panda Games, you will need to compete in a minimum of 3 games. Scattered throughout the vicinity are game stations. You will travel the world to find these game stations and complete the activities.

Once you have successfully completed 3 challenges, you will receive a passport stamped with the five red panda home range countries and an official Red Panda Ranger certificate, both personalized with your name. Your picture may also be taken so we can post your name and photo on our website and newsletter. We hope you will continue on your journey around the world and compete in all 5 challenges.

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Pandas in Peril

Game created by Amber Neilson,

Goal: To introduce players to the many challenges of the lives of Red pandas.

Grades: 2+ (reading required)

Supplies:

- 40 circles (spot markers or circles drawn with chalk on ground)
- Laminated instruction cards
- 1 Dice per player/team & 1 Coin Cup for rolling (yogurt cups)
- Panda Coins in 5 containers

Background: Red panda's face many threats in the wild. Bamboo die offs and predation are natural threats. More common threats include poachers who sell them as pets or hunt them for their fur. They also suffer from habitat loss from farming, livestock and harvesting of firewood. The Red Panda has a naturally low birth rate (usually single or twin births per year), and a high death rate in the wild. The number of Red pandas in the wild is unknown because they are elusive and hide in the forest canopy. Because their true population numbers are unknown, red pandas are currently listed as a "vulnerable species", but researchers believe they are more likely "endangered". Red pandas are an SSP species (Species Survival Plan); The SSP program was developed by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums to help ensure the survival of endangered species in zoos and aquariums. Many conservation programs are helping to save red pandas by educating local communities about their important ecological role in the bamboo forest (i.e. spreading seed through their excrement) and by attempting to document accurate size of wild populations. Red Panda Network is one of these agencies.

Set-up:

- Arrange circles in a giant U-shape, preferably with significant space in between circles so participants have to travel. Place instruction card on every 3rd circle with the Start and End cards on opposite ends of the U. Where instructed, place a cup of panda chips next to the corresponding instruction card.
- Split players into teams of two (or it can be just individuals)
- Give each player/team a dice and empty Coin Cup.

Playing the Game:

- Introduce red pandas and their natural history. Explain they will become red pandas and face challenges, as well as birth offspring.
- Instruct “pandas” that they must walk like a red panda on all fours from space to space.
- Each “panda” begins on START and rolls the dice. If they do not land on an instruction card, they roll again. They continue rolling while they move around the U-shape. If the “panda” lands on an instruction card, they read the instructions and follow the directions. When a card instructs that they “birthed a panda”, they pick up a Panda Coin.
- Ask each team to wait patiently until the team in front of them has had time to move on. Do not pass another panda team.

Assessment:

- When the pandas all reach the end, ask each panda to share about their journey including their # of offspring.
- Ask them about the most positive and devastating part of their journey.
- Discuss actions around the world and at zoos that are currently taking place to save the red pandas
- Collect Panda Coins and Dice.

Adaptations:

- * For non-readers: Team with an adult reader or another student that can read.
- * For readers: Each camper is either in a team of two or completing the journey solo. To maximize participant experience, it is recommended that no more than 2 in a team be allowed.
- * Have students write or draw a story about their journey
- * Have student research red panda conservation and fundraise for a non-profit organization.


(Role the dice and move forward)

Your mating call is heard by another red panda and you birth a cub. **Pick up 1 panda chip. Move forward 2 spaces.**

A conservation organization replants a forest. Now you have a nice green corridor to travel through. You birth a cub. **Pick up 1 panda chip. Move forward 2 spaces.**




Your habitat is protected by the community against deforestation. **Move forward 2 spaces.**

A bamboo die-off happens in your forest. You must seek new foraging grounds. **Move back 2 spaces.**

Cattle move up the slopes and into your forest, eating your bamboo. Time for you to wander in search of new habitat. **Move back 1 space.**

A bamboo die-off makes your forest isolated from other red pandas. No cubs are born this season. **Move back 1 space.**




The nearby bamboo forest where other red pandas live has been destroyed and they look for new forest. No cubs are born this season. **Move back 1 space.**

Some trees in your forest are cut down for fire wood. **Move back 2 spaces.**

You escape a hunter in your forest and you birth a panda cub. **Pick up 1 panda chip. Move forward 2 spaces.**

A hunter set a trap for you and you got stuck in it. You escape by need time to heal. **Move back 2 spaces.**



A predator is in your forest and you must hide high in the trees to remain camouflaged. **Move back 2 spaces.**

This season there was much rain and the bamboo grew well. You gave birth to two cubs. **Pick up 2 panda chips. Move forward 2 spaces.**

You were a great parent and your cub grew up and had a cub of its own. **Pick up 2 panda chips. Move forward 2 spaces.**







Firefox Fun Fact Sheet

Directions: Read one fact each time a participant correctly matches a pair of red panda images. Hand out this fact sheet at the end of the game.

1. The scientific name of red panda is *Ailurus Fulgens*.
2. The red panda is the original “panda” having been discovered 48 years before the giant black and white panda.
3. The word panda is derived from the Nepalese word for “eater of bamboo” – Nigalya Poonya.
4. The Chinese name for red panda is “hunho” which translated in English means firefox. This is due to their color and outer physical similarity to foxes.
5. Mozilla’s web browser “Firefox” is named after the red panda. Their logo is a red panda wrapped around the world.
6. Red pandas have an extra “thumb.” It’s an enlarged bone for grabbing bamboo stems.
7. Red pandas claws are sharp and can be pulled back like a cat.
8. Red pandas red and black colors are perfect for camouflaging from their predators. The red fur on their back is the same color as the moss found on trees where they live. Their black stomach makes them difficult to see from below. Perfect for camouflage.
9. Red pandas can live up to 14 years in zoos and are estimated to live roughly 7-8 years in the wild.
10. Red pandas are ready to have babies, called cubs, after they are a year old.
11. Red pandas are officially classified as carnivores. They will occasionally eat an egg, insect or small animal but mostly stick to a diet of bamboo leaves, grass and fruit.
12. Red pandas are most active in the early morning and late afternoon. They spend the rest of the day resting in trees to conserve their energy.
13. Biologically, red pandas are most closely related to the raccoons. They are similar to giant pandas and bears but are classified as a family species of their own.
14. There are 2 sub-species of red panda – *Ailurus Fulgens Fulgens* found in Nepal, India, China and Bhutan; and *Ailurus Fulgens Styani* found only in China and Burma.
15. A red panda eats approximately 200 leaves of bamboo daily.














Yucky! Sorry, but Little Firefox didn't like to eat tofu.






Yikes! Sorry, no Llamas here.


Hooray! You helped Little Firefox find his way home to Nepal.




Whew! What a trip but Little Firefox wouldn't live in Japan.





