Program Description: 3-D Community Services and Housing provides STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) programs, computer training for youth and adults, and financial literacy. 3-D Community Services and Housing also has a summer basketball clinic which provides fundamentals of basketball and good sportsmanship, college, awareness.

3-D Community Services and Housing in partnership with CLDA provides STEM activities through The Philadelphia Engineering and Science Explorers Program. The Philadelphia Engineering and Science Explorers program promotes STEM awareness in the Philadelphia area and has three components: an *Explorers STEM Academy* (for youth in grades 4-12), a *Parents STEM Academy*, and a *Teachers STEM Academy*.

3-D Community Services and Housing also has a 5 or 10 week computer refurbishing program for adults and youth. Students and adults learn computer hardware and software. In partnership with the FDIC, 3-D Community Services and Housing has a financial literacy program for middle school and high school students. 3-D Community Services and Housing also has a train-the-trainer program for sites who are interested in providing the curriculum to students using their own staff. Also, 3-D Community Services and Housing has a Basketball Clinic that provides youth in grades 9-12 with the fundamentals of basketball, conflict resolution, college awareness, and good sportsmanship.

Audience: The STEM program is for youth in grades 4-12. The Computer Refurbishing program is for students in grades K-12 and adults. The Basketball Clinic is for male youth in grades 9-12. The financial literacy program is for youth in grades 9-12. The number of students participating in a session is 10-15 students.

Ideal Environment for the Program: Indoors, classroom.

Duration: The programs are from October -June and last between 1.5 - 3 hours.

Program Description: The Academy of Natural Sciences is Philadelphia's natural history museum and offers science education to visitors of all ages. *Academy on the Go* brings the excitement of a museum visit —complete with specimens, live animals, audience participation and expert naturalists — directly to your program. Currently, 10 lesson programs are available which meet or exceed National Benchmarks for Science Literacy and Pennsylvania Academic Standards: *If We Could Talk to the Animals...; Animals with Bad Reputations; Everybody Needs a Home; Fur, Feathers and Scales; Amazing Adaptations; Raptors: Predators of the Sky; Discovering Dinosaurs; Geology Really Rocks; Bugs to Butterflies; and Discovering your World.*

Session helps promote science literacy, observation, and problem-solving skills.

Audience: The session can be geared towards any age group and any size group up to 200 people.

Ideal Environment for the Program: Any environment can be accommodated; the outdoors has special considerations.

Program Description: ASAP provides recreational opportunities for children in grades K-12, promoting skill-building, teamwork and fun. ASAP recruits, screens and trains volunteer activity leaders as well as OST staff to lead after school enrichment activities (chess, Scrabble, debate, drama) at local schools, libraries, community and recreation centers, and other out-of-school time programs.

Audience: K-12 (depends on the activity). ASAP works with youth all over Philadelphia in existing after school programs, focusing on at-risk youth. Additionally, our *Philly Girls Play Chess!* program offers support for female chess players, a cohort that typically drops off after middle school. Club size is typically 10-15 students.

Ideal Environment for the Program: ASAP partners with sites that have an existing after school program structure, and that are capable of supporting a volunteer Activity Leader on a weekly basis, as well as communicating with ASAP during the volunteer's service. ASAP also trains existing OST staff to lead clubs and provides materials for the club.

Duration: We require all volunteers and OST staff to commit to leading a club for a minimum of 1 hour a week for one semester.

Program Description: ArtWell empowers and transforms individuals and communities through creative and artistic expression. Using reflective arts programming, we foster creativity, enhance communication and literacy skills, deepen understandings of self and community, and ultimately reduce violence and increase peace within our city and region. As a non-sectarian organization, we help participants from diverse cultures and faith traditions throughout greater Philadelphia draw on their own beliefs to create positive change in their lives.

Program Offerings:

• *Heartspeak – Spoken Word/Visual Art*: Individuals learn to build confidence in self-expression through their poetry and artwork. We foster creativity and enhance communication and literacy skills, while encouraging a deeper understanding of self and community.

• *Heartspeak – Drama*: Through dramatization, improvisation, and role playing participants will tell their own stories and learn about one another. Exercises will build communication and conflict resolution skills, public speaking abilities and stage presence. • Art of Growing Up - a program that provides multicultural integrated arts curricula to give young people, families and communities the tools to guide, support, and thrive together amidst the challenges of adolescence.

• We the Poets - a unique 66 lesson curriculum, aligned with state and federal standards for grades 1-12. Because it is poetry focused, We the Poets has been used in Pennsylvania districts for standardized test (PSSAs) preparation tied to literacy comprehension.

Audience: *Heartspeak Programs* are for grades 6-12. *Art of Growing Up* can be modified for grades 5-9. *We the Poets* are appropriate for grades K-12.

Program Description: Personalized activities and workshops for youth and adults focusing on positive youth development. Training topics for youth include, but are not limited to: Asset Games, Career Exploration, College preparation, conflict resolution, job readiness, Peer Mediation, Service Learning planning/Civic Engagement, Cultural Competency and violence intervention/prevention. Training topics for adults include, but are not limited to: Positive Youth Development, Classroom Management, Youth Voice/Youth Choice, Program Development, Mentoring, Recruitment and Retention, and Supervision of Youth.

Students and adults are encouraged to create a youth voice, to have youth feel empowered within a programmatic infrastructure, and develop youth leadership skills with a primary goal of self-governance. Critical thinking, decision-making, and problem solving skills are also promoted.

Audience: The intended audience is program staff and older youth. The size of the audience depends upon the topic.

Ideal Environment for the Program: Depending on the topic, the ideal setting would be a classroom or other adequate and safe space.

Program Description: BuildaBridge is a 501c3 charitable organization that engages the transformative power of the arts to bring hope and healing to vulnerable children, families and communities in the tough places of the world. BuildaBridge accomplishes this mission through direct arts-based educational & therapeutic intervention in after-school, Saturday and summer programs; and through training artists in *The BuildaBridge Classroom*[™] a trauma-informed, hope-infused, child-centered replicable model that includes a restorative justice approach for working with youth. BuildaBridge is unique in that it is one of the only organizations working with the city's homeless and abused children & families as a primary constituency on a consistent, long-term basis through arts-based methods.

As part of the Artist-on-Call Program, BuildaBridge can send individual or teams of artists to out of school program sites. Teaching artists will conduct classes in the arts and arts-integrated curricula in the following mediums: Dance, drumming, culinary, visual arts, photography, etc. This list is not exhaustive as BuildaBridge's list of Artists-on-Call numbers more than 200. BuildaBridge encourages a team-teaching method to ensure an adult to student ratio of 5:1.

We also offer Adult Trainings to prepare practitioners in a number of areas related to their work in afterschool, community and school settings, including: *All Things BuildaBridge; The BuildaBridge Classroom; Curriculum Writing & Assessment; Classroom Management; Cross-Cultural Contexts; Arts Relief; Art as Metaphor; Introduction to Restorative Practices;* and *Using Circles Effectively*.

Audience: Programs can be tailored and designed to meet the needs of any age group, particularly atrisk youth. The majority of BuildaBridge's constituency is ages 7 to 12.

Ideal Environment for the Program: The ideal environment is a clean, safe and secure space, preferably a classroom. The type of art medium will further determine whether the space requires tables or a large room for dancing. The minimum number of youth to participate is seven and the maximum is fifteen.

Duration: Classes are 1.5 hours. Length of time can be flexible depending on the population or organization's needs.

Program Description: Champions of Caring educates and empowers teens to become leaders in service and advocates for social justice through in-school, afterschool, and community-based character education and service-learning programs. CoC works with students, educators, and community leaders to create sustainable and impactful service-learning projects, and develop cultures of caring in schools and communities.

Audience: For students in grades 8-12: The Champions of Caring Recognition Program honors teens for their commitment to service (Applications are available online: <u>www.championsofcaring.org</u>). Once students are selected as Champions, the Ambassadors of *Caring Leadership Program* brings together students from diverse backgrounds for monthly workshops to train them in the skill sets to create service projects based upon the issues they care about most. Students become social entrepreneurs, and receive training from community experts in various fields (i.e. public speaking, public relations, political advocacy, grantwriting and fundraising, etc).

Program Description: The Claymobile is a traveling ceramic art program that brings clay classes to schools, community-based organizations, and social service organizations in the greater Philadelphia region. The Claymobile van transports everything needed for the class - including the teachers! Finished works of art are fired at The Clay Studio and returned to the students at the end of the session. Included with the lesson are handouts that describe clay and the process used in making things with clay as well as puzzles and games that can be used to teach that information.

As a result of participating in the Claymobile program, students will acquire ceramic arts skills; be encouraged to use the arts to express their ideas and feelings; increase problem solving skills; improve social interaction and communication; develop a sense of independence and self-confidence; and develop listening skills.

Audience: The Claymobile serves children and adults ages pre-K through senior citizen. They work with a maximum of 20 children during after-school and summer programs, and will work with a full classroom size during the school-day.

Ideal Environment for the Program: A classroom with adequate seating and working surface (i.e. long folding tables).

Duration: The program runs once a week for 6 to 12 weeks. Each visit is for 90 minutes with the same group of children.

Fees: There is a subsidized fee of \$200/class (\$1,200 for a 6 week session). Please call to inquire about our sliding scale.

Program Description: The Empowerment Group's *Youth Entrepreneurship Program* provides hands-on after-school and summer courses on how to start your own business. Children learn about what goes into starting and running a business while actually planning and running their own venture. They explore how they can incorporate their skills and interests into a business venture, perform market research, learn about industry research, price their goods and services, and sell to their target customers. They gain important practice in public speaking and effective communication as well as learn the importance of keeping good financial records. Course materials include worksheets, case study handouts, and some text materials from the *National Foundation for Teaching Entrepreneurship*. There are also opportunities for field trips to local businesses to interview owners and learn how different businesses operate.

Children are taught leadership, professionalism, problem-solving, and communication skills, as well as the importance of teamwork, organization, good planning, financial literacy, public presentation and empowerment through entrepreneurship.

Audience: The curriculum is adaptable for children from elementary through high school. The classes are designed for small groups; individual instructors generally work with no more than 20 children.

Ideal Environment for the Program: The class is best taught in a classroom that lends itself to group work and has materials available for brainstorming.

Duration: The program normally runs for 10-12 weeks, 1-2 hours per week. The curriculum can be broken down to different lengths of time, from a single workshop to a year-long course, depending on the needs of partnering organizations. The program can start at any time during the year.

Fees: \$50/hour. Cost covers teacher salary and program supplies.

Program Description: Fairmount Park Commission (FPC)* staff lead volunteer groups in ecological restoration projects in the Fairmount Park system. These projects include trail improvements, invasive plant removal, native plant installation, and general park clean-ups. Each project incorporates education about environmental issues, challenges facing the park system, and how the volunteer activity fits into the "big picture." All tools, equipment, materials and required training are provided by FPC.

Volunteering in the park promotes a child's ability to work with others and offers a chance to practice and learn communication skills and environmental awareness.

Audience: Can be tailored to any group size or age, since staff has extensive experience working with a wide range of audiences. The FPC tries to maintain a volunteer-to-staff ratio of 15:1 for school-age participants. Therefore, the size of the group depends partially on the availability of FPC staff.
