From the Desk of the President ...

The United Way Campaign is almost over and we are at 92% of our goal of \$900,000. NOW is the time to talk to your neighbors, friends, and coworkers about all the good work that the United Way of Milford does in our community. You could add that the United Way cares about the future of our city and its next generation and supports organizations like Kids Count of Milford, the Boys and Girls Club, Milford's Promise, and the Young Parent Program of Milford. And you can tell them that here at the United Way we are always looking for new ways to meet our city's needs through programs like the Juvenile Justice Diversion Program and the Healthy Baby Diaper Drive.

Once you've told your friends, neighbors, and coworkers about how important and vital the work of the United Way is, let them know the time to make a contribution is NOW. The campaign ends March 31. By giving to the United Way we can make our city a better place to live. A contribution to the United Way of Milford is an investment in our community.

FamilyWize Saves Milford Residents

Thousands of prescriptions go unfilled simply because they are too expensive to fill. But free FamilyWize prescription discount cards, provided by the United Way of Milford, address this problem. Last year, this partnership saved residents \$159,156 by cutting the cost of medicines an average of 35 percent.

"More and more we're finding that the high price of medicine means that people have to make a choice. They

can either fill a prescription or put food on the table and keep a roof over their head," says Gary Johnson, President of the United Way of Milford. "FamilyWize free prescription cards save an average of \$20 per prescription. Those savings often mean the difference between taking a medicine or skipping it."

FamilyWize prescription cards are accepted at 95% of pharmacies nationwide, including all major chains. The service is free, does not require enrollment or personal information, and is available to anyone. Cards are available at the United Way of Milford or can be downloaded at www.FamilyWize.org.

Milford's 4th Parent Leadership Training Institute (PLTI), a collaborative effort between the Milford



Health Department, Milford Public Schools, the United Way of Milford, and Kids Count of Milford, began this past January. PLTI was developed by the State of Connecticut's Commission on Children to enable parents to become leading advocates for children. Cornerstones of the program are respect, validation, and a belief that when the tools of democracy are understood the public will actively engage in civic life. PLTI students participate in an 18 week program designed to provide the civic and leadership skills needed to work in the community on behalf of children. Participants also complete a community pro-

Women with United Vision Announces Healthy Baby Diaper Drive

Women with United Vision, a women's initiative of the United Way of Milford, plans to collect 10,000 diapers during the month of March as part of their Healthy Baby Diaper Drive. The diapers will be distributed to local Milford families through United Way agencies and the Department of Human Services.

"Many struggling families cannot afford sufficient quantities of diapers for their children," Darcy Ellis, co-chair of WUV said. "And since daycare facilities require parents to supply their own diapers, lack of diapers becomes an obstacle for working parents. Diapers cannot be purchased with food stamps or through the WIC federal program and can cost families an average of \$100 per month."

Melissa Wunder, chairperson of WUV's Healthy Baby Diaper Drive and PTA Council Vice President, has been working to involve Milford area schools in this project. "We are thrilled to have so many schools participating," Wunder said. "The principals and PTAs are committed to helping Milford families in need."

Additionally, several local businesses have agreed to serve as collection points and to encourage their employees and customers to contribute. Diapers can be dropped off at the following locations: ShopRite of Milford, Super Stop and Shop on East Town Road, Woodruff Family YMCA, GE Federal Credit Union, IKON Office Solutions, Turner Construction, Sand Castle Learning Center, Trixie Salon, and Milford Public Schools. City of Milford Juvenile Justice Diversion Program

The City of Milford Juvenile Justice Diversion Program begins this month. The program, funded by the United Way, is a collaboration between the Milford Police Department and Milford Youth and Family Services and is designed to divert Milford juveniles who have committed a first time, non-violent offense away from the Juvenile Justice System while providing them an opportunity to develop responsibility and accountability, increase problem resolution skills, and strengthen family relationships. The juvenile would attend 5 meetings, four with a Marriage and Family Therapist and a Police Office to explore present challenges in the juvenile's life and healthy solutions. The final meeting is a family assessment with the juvenile, family, and the therapist. Upon completion of the program, the arrest will be cleared and continued services will be available if needed. The program is at no cost to the participant or the family.

The Kennedy Center presents their 6th Annual Magic Moments event on March 24th at the Quick Center for the Arts at





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
