REGISTRATION

You may register online on the Gathering website or download a registration form here. If you need a paper copy, please contact the national office at 301-595-0626.

Unlike a hotel that charges high prices for accommodations and meals to cover the cost of meeting space, the University of New Mexico, similar to other universities, keeps room and board prices low but charges for meeting space. Therefore we are asking for a higher than usual price for registration. The early bird rate is \$175 and by June this goes up to \$200. We are hoping many members will donate to the assistance fund to help those who need it with the cost of registration.

ACCOMMODATIONS AND MEALS

We have worked to make this as affordable as possible. We will be staying in a recently opened dorm, Casa del Rio, http://casasdelriounm.com. Two adjoining rooms share a bathroom. Each is fully furnished and includes two twin-sized beds, internet access, air conditioning, and its own microwave and min-refrigerator. Additionally, two of the four floors in the dorm have a communal kitchen. And the price is right at \$39 per person per night double occupancy including breakfast and taxes, \$44 for single occupancy. Children 12 and under can sleep on the floor on mats or air mattresses without charge. You will have to provide your own linen or rent this from the university at \$11 for the week. We are also providing a list of moderately priced hotels in the area. Please see the Gathering website for more details http://subudusa.wix.com/2013gathering.

The meal rates are also quite reasonable. Lunches and dinners on Friday and Saturday are \$9 and \$11 respectively. This price includes tax. Prices will be \$1.00 higher for each meal on Thursday, July 4th as the cafeteria is closed on this day and we will eat in the Student Union Building. A Wednesday dinner is also being offered for those arriving early.

FACILITIES

Indoor activities of all kinds will be in the student union building. We reserved nine rooms just for workshops and personal testing plus additional space for childcare and the gift shop – all on the same floor. The ballrooms for latihan are over 4,000 square feet each. The lower level of this building is perfect for hanging out and socializing, equipped with ping pong tables and chairs.

UNM is only 3-1/2 miles from the airport. You can get to the campus via shuttle, bus, or taxi. Parking is \$1.75 an hour or \$28 a week.

CHILD AND YOUTH PROGRAMMING

There will be separate programming for children aged 0-4, children 5-12, and youth 13-16. If parents are interested, a no fee child coop run by parents will be organized for children 0-4. A team of Subud members is working on programming for children in the 5-12 and 13-16 age categories. One goal of the team is to have many workshops be intergenerational so children and youth of all ages can participate. Additional programming is also being provided. The cost will be \$15 per day per child on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

OTHER MEETINGS

Our Zone 7 Council will be meeting here as well, starting from July 6 through July 8. Subud USA members are welcome to attend. We have invited council members (from Canada, Mexico, and Suriname) to join us for the gathering to enrich our sharing of cultures. We are preparing for the coming of the world congress. There will be brief updates on the world congress preparations and on what has been going on in Subud USA and Susila Dharma USA.

Come! Bring your laughter, prayers and dancing shoes!


ABOUT ALBUQUERQUE

Albuquerque, the largest city in the state of New Mexico, also known as the Land of Enchantment, is welcoming you. The 10,600-foot high Sandia Mountains run along the eastern edge of Albuquerque and the legendary Rio Grande flows through the city north to south. Some 870,000 people, more than a third of the state's population, live in the Albuquerque Metropolitan Area situated at 5,000 to 6,500 feet above sea level. Albuquerque, and Santa Fe and Taos to the north, are known for their active art and cultural communities with deep roots in Native American and Hispanic cultures.

Summer daytime highs are usually in the 90s while dropping into the 60s to 70s overnight. You will find the climate pleasing except for the afternoon heat out in the sun. Due to the high altitude, you may not want to rush into busy physical activities for the first few days; you may run out of breath. Drinking lots of water helps to prevent dehydration in the arid climate and high altitude.

A bit of history: Albuquerque was founded in 1706 as a Spanish colonial outpost. The original town of Albuquerque was built in the traditional Spanish village

pattern: a central plaza surrounded by government buildings, church and homes. The central plaza has been well preserved, known as Old Town, a major tourist attraction. You will find the century-old adobe buildings fascinating and dining in New Mexican cafes delicious. Local artisans display their arts and crafts on the Plaza. Also located in Old Town is the Explora Science Center and Children's Museum, which provide a rich experience for both young people and adults.

Now that I am working in the Subud USA office, I am doing everything I can to build up our assistance fund for this year's national gathering. SUBUD BOSTON IN WAKE OF MARATHON BOMBING AND SCARES

Well, this whole Boston region has been in a state of high anxiety; we are all a little more vigilant, not wanting any more surprises for a while.

Subud Boston had its monthly Helper-Committee Latihan and Meeting this last Sunday and, because of the tumultuous events of the week starting with Monday, April 15th's terrible Marathon Bombing and then the search for suspects and police work on Tuesday and Wednesday, Thursday's carjacking, killing, wild-west style car chase, standoff, bullets and bombs used unsparingly and finally Friday's capture of the younger brother, amazing symbology, captured in a boat on dry land, because of all this, I asked the group if anyone thought we should do something, as in contributing to a fund or even simply to share their feelings about it. There followed a rich discussion and expression of thoughts and feelings - from feeling empathy to the 'brainwashed' younger brother (not confirmed yet) to relief and even a kind of joy that we got the bad guys onward to seeing all

this in a wider context - one member said that during this same period in Iraq alone, close to 40 people had died in roadside / suicide bombings.

We have received regards from brothers and sisters here and there already, as we know many more, in our wider community of inner feeling, are one with us, as we go forward together.

I write this at work, off the cuff, but I hope it gives us all more of a feeling of being there, a little closer to the action. I myself was listening to music like Up On Cripple Creek (The Band) with friends in a Somerville bar on last Thursday night, no more than 4 miles from the site of the carjacking, 7-11 Holdup, car chase and eventual shootout on a Watertown street.

Baby, baby, it's a wild world. Stay with that latihan. It may just come in handy one of these days.

GROUPS AND CENTERS

SUBUD ALBUQUERQUE

Initially some Gurdjieff followers founded a Subud group in Albuquerque in the 1960s. Despite its distance and isolation from the rest of the country as well as its relatively smaller size, Albuquerque is blessed with a Subud group in existence since then. A number of Subud members have come and gone over the years. Fortunately, however, a few 'old timers' have been practicing latihan together here for half a century, thereby maintaining a Subud group intact. Raphael Seidel is a sole member who has been doing latihan regularly and continuously in the Albuquerque Subud group since 1967.

Currently we have latihan twice a week, Monday evening at a Mennonite Church and Thursday afternoon at an Episcopal Church. Currently, 7 men and 8 women attend the latihan regularly, and we have two women applicants. Reflecting perhaps our regional culture, our group has not been formally organized. There has been no committee in the group. Any organized activities, when needed, have been conducted in an informal manner. Now, however, we have Treasurer for the first time in many years. Hopefully, this will lead to some organizational development in our group. It should be noted that Albuquerque has hosted two Rocky Mountain Regional meetings in the last four years.

SUBUD SOUTHEAST MICHIGAN

Michigan has been without a 'center' since the mid '80s when members of the Detroit group gave up their latihan facilities. Even though the Detroit group was no longer meeting many of its members remained in the SE Michigan region and were isolated for over 15 years. But despite the sizable distances, we remained in touch, using Olaf Bowman's house in Ann Arbor as our hub.

Unfortunately, when Olaf sold his Ann Arbor house the few scattered members became isolated once again. It was several more years before the more 'senior' members got tired of doing latihan alone and decided to find a central location where we could latihan together – at least once a month.

Being so spread out is a real problem. For the 40% of us in the USA not near a Subud group it is easy to understand how travel distances become a barrier to doing latihan together.

The most central location for us turned out to be Brighton, Michigan - it was a 60ish minute drive for several of us — a bit more for others. We started our search with local Unitarian Churches in the Brighton area but they insisted on liability insurance. Finally, in the spring of 2006, we found a Yoga Center that would rent to us at \$30 an hour. So we committed to the 3rd Sunday of each month. The Yoga Center was in an odd location in an out of the way business/industrial complex — so not

ideal but the space was great - five men were doing latihan in a room that could easily hold 45.

The twist to this story is that within six months the owner of the Yoga Center moved to a more suitable location. It was a mile from the main interstate and she agreed to rent the space for two hours a month. This meant that we could have consecutive latihans for the five men followed by the two ladies. This new location was a perfect arrangement with members being able to socialize in the coffee shop on the first floor, while the others did latihan upstairs in the yoga center. Having a central location that

really works is a big plus for groups that are spread out. Over time the men's group increased from five to fifteen (however, two left) and the ladies group increased from two to five and one applicant.

Over the past five years Molly, the owner of the coffee shop, knows when we are coming and reserves tables for our group and LeeAnn, the owner of the yoga center, now rents to us twice a month.

While we are not a 'center' yet our group life is good and we are growing inwardly and outwardly.

SUBUD DURHAM HOUSE LOAN

In the November Subud USA Newsletter we were delighted to report on Subud Durham's new latihan space. They purchased a 7+ acre parcel of land consisting of two adjacent wooded lots, one with an existing church, a converted double-wide trailer which the group is using for latihan. They now plan to build a 1900 sq. ft. latihan hall on this lot.

The Subud Durham Committee writes:

We're blessed, but not satisfied. The trailer doesn't have a long shelf life, and is far from ideal in terms of accommodating simultaneous latihans for large groups of men and women. We want this place to be a resource not only for our group but also for smaller Subud groups and for isolated members around the state. So the group gulped again and embarked on a project to build a new hall. We raised more than \$12,000 in cash and received a \$20,000 loan from Subud USA. The Muhammad Subud Foundation has loaned us an additional \$20,000 and added to that a grant for the same amount. The lender for the purchase of the land forgave \$25,000 of the debt, increasing the group's capacity for the monthly payment on these loans. And we raised \$25,000 more by selling three acres of the parcel to a group of Subud members, who plan to use it for a sustainable agriculture project. Hurray!

When the editor of MSF's newsletter asked us to contribute an article explaining what the new latihan hall means to us, we thought, who better to answer this than Subud Durham's young people, who make this group so vibrant and motivated. Here's their response, written by Madelyn Ward (age 18) and organized by Madelyn and by Fatimah Bustillo (age 21).

As a child of Subud, I have always known the love of my Subud brothers and sisters (and aunts and uncles) to be a special one. It belonged to nice ladies in long skirts who

cooked delicious foreign meals, and gentleman with eyes that crinkled when they teased me and my sisters about how tall we'd grown. And this love belonged to kids who knew what I meant when I said the word "Subud." But I experienced a place just for Subud only once. The atmosphere was heavenly...

Last year my family and I moved to North Carolina, and Subud Durham. We were warmly welcomed by 25 members (12 of whom are under the age of 25) and nine more children too young to be opened. Here are some of the reasons why the youth of Subud Durham are excited about our new home:

- The best thing is that it's ours. You feel like it's a more special place. To be able to own it is like a gift from God. (Latimah – 23)
- We can have a place to do activities and extra things. It's nice to go there and see our friends.
 And we have a place to play soccer if we want.
 We can make it however we want. (Marini – 17)
- The best thing is having a space to hang out with the Subud group, and the kids don't have to stay home when everyone else is at latihan! We're able to be part of the group more. (Bella – 12)
- You can make as much noise as you want. Like if you have to yell during latihan, you can do it freely. (Bakhtiar – 20)
- The youth will have things to do during latihan. (Arief – 11)

WORLD SUBUD ASSOCIATION e-NEWS: a FOCUS ON CENTERS

The April WSA News begins: "This is the first in a series of articles and observations about issues of particular importance to us as Subud members around the world" and lists Subud Centers first. Here's an excerpt:

The strength and vitality of Subud which is based on reality depends on the health of the Subud groups in the centres. Subud Centres represent our intake of oxygen; this is where the latihan happens. They also represent the interface with the world around us... So how can we encourage and support the development of the quality of the Subud groups, besides what we are already doing well?

Well, the first and essential aspect is always the latihan. Everything comes from the latihan. But if we do not have the courage and energy to implement and carry out what we receive, the latihan does not develop; it remains the same. I believe that this is valid for individuals and for groups, too. Subud Centers are also an expression of that: a balance of the material and spiritual aspects.

So what can we do right here right now? First, we can agree on and commit to a Subud endeavour or initiative to support our centres. This means some kind of renewal in our commitment would take place... we could come up with some kind of integrated approach to support the development of Subud groups in the following years. Perhaps at Puebla World Congress we can have a Subud Centers/communities theme day. ...We plan to send out a letter on this accompanied by a short survey assessing the general activities around Subud centres/houses.

ATALANTA: WHAT'S NEXT AND AN INVITATION

A project in the high desert of Colorado, from Marcella Lunt

The birth of Atalanta came to my mother, Joanna Dokson, through a series of receiving's during a Ramadan fast in 1974. In these experiences she saw people of many generations and cultures working together....She identified the mountains years later as the Sangre De Cristo Mountains in Colorado from a picture in National Geographic. Years after that, she learned of an organization that gave land grants to spiritual and environmental groups. Jumping forward again - after a series of meetings, latihans, and testing, forty-four acres in the high mountain San Luis Valley were granted to SICA for the project. Ibu Rahayu gave the name "Atalanta" with the meaning "Learning to live with personal responsibility, in peace and harmony with all creation." When the Atalanta Association was granted non-profit status the title was transferred from SICA to Atalanta.

Because the visions that gave birth to Atalanta were clear that it was to serve the world community, not only Subud, it was accepted that Atalanta was not solely a "Subud Project," but a project started by Subud members. In the beginning there was great enthusiasm. Subud members from around the world attended the ground blessing ceremony in 1994 along with many people from local spiritual groups. Over the years there have been many programs and workshops run with and by Atalanta...including the Cooperative Garden. In 2003 the 2nd International Varindra T. Vittachi Conference on Educating for a Human Future brought together young people from around the world.

As is typical of most organic inhabitants of the desert, Atalanta has been slowly establishing its roots and foundations, battling drought, sun, wind, cold as well as human obstacles. In addition to the successful programs, Atalanta has obtained new access to the land, making it more convenient and shortening the drive significantly. Recent renegotiations with Manitou Foundation, the land grantor, have solidified Atalanta's presence in the community and helped Atalanta move forward with simplified land use guidelines.

From the first brain storming, latihan, and testing - long before I became involved with Atalanta - it was part of



the plan to have a designated Latihan Hall/Subud House on the Atalanta land. Atalanta is important to the community, to Subud and to the world. Here we are, at a crossroad, with this land, this project and these receivings. What do we do next?

I invite you to email any of us with questions, thoughts or ideas. Think about your relationship with Atalanta, and if you feel so moved, test about your relationship or about Atalanta's role in the world.

We would like to extend an invitation to all Subud members who would like to visit Atalanta after the National Gathering in Albuquerque. There will be volunteer opportunities and accommodations, including rooming or camping at the Baca Grande Stables or on the Atalanta property. SEVEN CIRCLES SEEKS CARETAKING COUPLE



"NOT MY WILL BUT THY WILL, OH LORD!" (or "Not 'My-Kraine' but U-kraine") Marsiya Belinska and Sandra Lykhatska on behalf of the National Committee and all Subud Ukraine explain how Subud came to be there and Emmanuel Aronie's integral role.

Twenty years have passed since that day when we heard for the first time the word "Subud" from the stage of a big conference room first in Kyiv and then in Cherkassy. Emmanuel (then Seth) Aronie went to Ukraine from the USA together with a group of hypnotherapists and healers on the program-trip called "A Healing Arts Workshop Program in the Soviet Union".

In his letter from Kyiv to Subud USA Seth wrote: "First night in Kyiv, about 300 people showed up for the general session, in which all the ten "healers" made their presentations. My introduction went for six or seven minutes, with translation. But before I made this short talk, I already felt some light energies. In fact, as particular people took their seats in the audience, I felt several times an impulse inside. As you might expect,

these were the people who ended up coming to the Subud workshop and being interested in the latihan. ... The great majority reported having significant inner experiences, before or during the workshops."

Seth had no choice but to start applicants meetings (men and women together, for which we jokingly called him papa-mama). He was staying in Kyiv and coming to Cherkassy every two weeks. In so doing, he kept correspondence with International Helpers. After two months the IHs Khadariyah Gardiner and Leonard Lasalle assisted by Istafiyah, a Russian speaking helper from England, came to conduct the first openings. In all, a startling total of 98 people were finally opened in Ukraine and almost all sang and moved straight away.

Emmanuel did not leave us but stayed in Ukraine for a year shuttling from Kyiv to Cherkassy to do the latihan with his new brothers and sisters and talk about the latihan.

Several years before his visit to Ukraine Seth began studying Slavic languages... As Emmanuel recalls, he does not know why he felt drawn to this part of the world (his roots are in Lithuania, though), why he started studying Russian (when he came to Ukraine, he could speak Russian fairly well). "Do you know how it feels to suddenly get a constantly available energy to do something? Well, that year it was, and still is, Russian for me".

We are happy to be a part of the world Subud family. Many, many thanks! We are waiting for all of you, dear Subud brothers and sisters. Welcome to Ukraine.

She 'always tries to listen to the little dribbles of guidance the universe sends my way...'

When I started canning I was 27 years old... One summer afternoon, a friend and I drove out to a u-pick farm in southern New Jersey and proceeded to spend hours filling large plastic buckets with blueberries. I went home with 13 pounds of blueberries, as well as a bulging bag of imperfect peaches. I spread my bounty across the dining room table, gathered my jars, and called my mom, Leana, for a quick cross-country canning refresher (if you've ever gone to Menucha, you may well have picked up a jar of her jam).

I had grown up watching her can and had always been a willing helper. Happily, I managed to make my jam, get it into jars and run it through the canning pot without breakage or any major disasters. When I pulled the jars out of my stockpot and lined them up on the counter to cool and seal, I knew that this was something I wanted to do again.

In those early days, I did a great deal of reading about canning. One of the things I found most immediately frustrating about the available writing on the topic was that often, the recipes and cookbooks told you how you had to do it, without offering any explanation as to why it had to be done that way. I've never been good at blindly following instructions that were offered without rationale

and so I started to research the reasoning behind canning. I started the Food in Jars blog as a way to share the things I was learning. [Plus] in the time I've spent writing about canning and teaching classes, I've learned that people come to canning with a lot of fear and anxiety. They're certain that it's more work than they can handle or that they're going to end up making someone sick thanks to an imperfectly preserved jar. I work on helping people release these fears.

In our society, canning food is an optional occupation. Living on the 20th floor of a high rise apartment building in Center City Philadelphia means that I don't always fit the mold of a traditional canner. But canning gives you a connection to your food in a way that simply does not exist otherwise. My first cookbook, called Food in Jars: Preserving in Small Batches Year-Round, was published by Running Press in May 2012 and is available wherever books are sold. A second book is due very soon.

Halimah Martin wrote of Marisa's blog: I'd been hunting for a good recipe for quince marmalade, and stumbled on a really awesome website called 'Food In Jars'. I didn't pay much attention to the woman's name who launched this website, but I did pay attention to the fact that it was very well-written, had very nice photographs, and overall had that extra stamp of quality. It turns out that this woman is...Marisa! I was flabbergasted and thrilled!

RAINA ROSE AND THE NASHVILLE FILM FESTIVAL

everywhere mistakes may have been made, but overall Subud has a good reputation in Lewes.

The direct consequences of this is as far as I



can see are many new candidates and members to the point that many times Latihan there is totally overcrowded and that Subud has won the tender for the development of a large project. This is for two reasons: one, they had the best project and two, they have a good track record. So why do we not see this mixture of courage to do BIG projects together and total openness about Subud being behind what we do, as having a direct influence on the number of new people who come?

THE STORY OF HO THI LOAN, Landmine Survivor

Interview with Mardijah Tarantino, SD USA Communication Liaison

Sitting in front of me I see, on my computer screen, a lovely young lady of 22. She looks like any other young woman, except when she shows me her foot, which is abnormally shaped. "Disabled, I would have had to forage in the forest for a living the rest of my life. But I have been so fortunate – I wish I had brought my gold medals to show you!"

This is the story of Ho Thi Loan, who is from the Bru mountain tribe, a poor, ethnic Vietnamese minority. She begins by telling me how she was injured as a child and how her life has changed beyond anything she could have hoped for.

"My mother tells me this story, as I cannot remember it. My parents were poor farmers in the mountains. There, it is customary to carry out the slash and burn methods of farming. One day, when I was about two years old, without my parents knowing I followed them out in the fields and I was playing not far away, when there was a sudden explosion. The fire had ignited a hidden bomb. The explosion badly injured my right foot. My parents took me to have it looked at, but the medical conditions where we lived were not very advanced. All they did was give me a shot against infection.

"As the years passed, my foot grew worse. It hurt terribly, but there was nothing they could do. I was too crippled and in too much pain to work in the fields. The most I could do was hobble out to the forest to gather wild fruit. That was my life, and there was no possibility of a different future."

"And now you must meet her coach —" [said the translator]. "My second mother," said Ho Thi Loan. "She is the one who saved me from that life." An older woman, the coach in question suddenly appeared on the screen and sat down next to Ho Thi. "My coach, who is a sports disability government official, was scouting for candidates in rural areas to train for a national swimming team of disabled athletes."

"One day," Ho Thi continued, "Coach came to our farmhouse. She could see how interested and enthusiastic I was and how eager I was to take advantage of this opportunity." Ho Thi looked down at her lap. "She had no luck in persuading my parents. They told her that a young girl should not be alone out in the world, and especially since she was a cripple. They could not be persuaded. But the coach" (here the two ladies looked at each other with warm smiles,) "my second mother - didn't give up. She returned several times until she finally persuaded them."

"Then there was the problem of my foot, which continued to be painful and crippling. In reality, I was in no state to endure such training. When my coach took me to have the foot examined, we learned that I would need several expensive operations. So much time had gone by since I had been wounded. Who would pay for that? No one could bear that expense, not my coach and certainly not my family. Then my coach had an idea: she had heard about the branch of *Clear Path International* that sponsored surgical operations for athletes. At the CPI surgery, I held my breath as they examined me. Then they agreed to take me as a patient. It was in 2005 when I underwent the operations." Ho Thi clenched her mouth remembering. It must have been so painful.

"Slowly I got well. Finally I could get around and begin learning swimming techniques..."

"She very soon became a champion swimmer," interrupted the coach, "such an excellent swimmer that last year she competed in the National Sports Olympics for the Disabled in Ho Chi Min City where she earned 5 gold medals and one silver!"

REFLECTION: THE WORDS YOUNG AND YOUTH WITHIN SUBUD USA

I have had thoughts around the words youth and young within Subud for many years now. Maybe this curiosity is related to whatever it is in me that had me test to be Subud Youth (and

Family) Activities Co-coordinator last summer. Either way, I have decided to share some of my musings with the hope that in doing so, fresh thoughts, ideas, and reflections are stimulated in my Subud Sisters and Brothers. I ask that, before you continue on, you get quiet and open, so that you will hear my voice and will be moved with compassion and understanding. Thank you.

Over the 15 years I have been part of Subud, I have been called Youth or a young person many, many a time. Ironically, both my internal response at being identified with these words as well as the use of this identification have not changed much over the years, although my age has. I recall, in my early twenties, being called young by both people within and outside of Subud. My response: annoyance because I identified the word young with lacking life experience and wisdom, frustration because it was true, I didn't have a clue. I also identified it with a strong body, a quick mind, a fresh outlook, and a whole life to create in front of me.

In my late twenties, mother of three small children, a pair of wild twin boys no less, my response was very similar, with a slight shift. By now I was able to look at the little bit of life I had lived and realize that many of my decisions, although 'right' in my receiving, could be viewed as quite 'stupid.' Nonetheless, it was my life. I embraced it. I had used my young body to have three lively children full of potential, and I threw myself into the task of raising them.

I took responsibility for my life. I went back to school to become a teacher. I bought a house. I co-founded a school. I used my mind and my heart to give my children what I had not been able to when they were small. I experienced my first big loss, the death of my older sister and my niece. I began to understand the complexities of life. By now, in my non-Subud life, I wasn't being identified as youth any more. I had grown into a woman. However, within Subud I was still termed youth or a young person. The term was used by different people with different flavor-- sometimes with longing, sometimes with frustration and a 'where are they' sentiment, and sometimes in a way I just didn't understand. My feeling of annoyance was now overlaid with confusion. How could I still be seen as youth in my thirties? With four children, two houses, a master's degree, in addition to all the life experience and over 10 years of the latihan. When would I be able to be embraced as grown up?

I figured there must be some explanation. Somewhere I thought I had read, or heard maybe, that Bapak had identified youth within Subud as those opened members under 30. Okay, I can still accept this, I told myself, and it is all with good intentions. However, I continued to feel very uncomfortable. It was bad enough to often be one of a handful of members under 50 at a Subud event, but it was straight out embarrassing to be pointed out and then identified as youth or a young person.

I am in my late thirties now. I acknowledge I look young, it is a compliment to be told that. However, I am definitely not young. I have a teenage daughter and twins soon to be. Within the next 2 to 5 years, they could be a part of Subud Youth. I have seen my mother die in old age and have become the matriarch of my family. I have learned that my body isn't as 'young as it once was'. I look at people older than I am and realize that, I am not there yet, life will keep coming at me and I will continue to have to adjust. I am no longer the youth I once was who lived in the feeling of eternity or invincibility with a

whole life in front of me. No, it is pretty clear to me, that my life is that of an adult, what some may call the prime time of life.

However, within Subud, people not just in their 30's, like I am, but also in their 40's continue to be called young people. I suspect that we have kept this strange identity, because those in the 30 and 40 something age within Subud are the age of people who were the first to be 'born' into Subud. Subud within the USA could be seen as a young organization, at least in practical terms. It is the first time in Subud USA that there are members, their children, and grandchildren spanning the human life span. However, this organizational immaturity is reflected by the imbalance of members across this span. Most active Subud members are over the age of 50. There are many explanations for this. An obvious one is that those of us in our 30's and 40's are raising kids and pursuing careers and thus don't have time. However, wasn't Subud 'run' by people in this age group just 20 or so years ago? One might argue that times have gotten harder. I'm sure there are many possible explanations. I posit, that among these explanations should be that youth have not been given the opportunity to grow up within the minds of those a generation ahead of them.

Well, what's the big deal, you might ask. Why don't you 'young people' just get involved so we 'old people' can let go of the reins? Well there are interesting implications of this phenomenon, in my mind. The first implication is that being called young or youth elicits in me a strong emotional response. When I hear myself being called youth or a young person, the neural pathways I developed in my brain as a youth are reactivated and I feel the way I did back then. This is a natural response,

but it takes a lot of mindfulness to refrain from reacting automatically. I know I really dislike the feeling I have inside when this happens and it takes energy away from the task at hand as I refocus my attention. Additionally, using that term likely results in the speaker reverting to the emotional state they were in when originally using the term.

I don't have any control over what I am called by others. The only choices I have are to suppress my reaction or conscientiously respond, both of which utilize a significant amount of my cognitive capacity in any given moment. The consequences? I can imagine this phenomenon leaves people my age reluctant to participate. I know it has taken a lot of perseverance on my part to participate despite these experiences. Also, it has become a negatively reinforcing cycle: there are not very many people my age involved in Subud and because of this the paradigm is more easily maintained and then there is more reluctance to participate. There is another consequence I see... If people in my age range are being called young people or youth where will those who are under 30 fit into Subud? I imagine it may be strange for them to be termed youth along with their parents or people their parents' age.

I suspect, by writing this, I have rocked the boat a bit. I suspect that this will insult some. It isn't intended to insult. I hope if you feel insulted you will be able to come back to viewing these musings as I have intended; to bring awareness to the possible impact of using a the words young or youth and what it elicits in others. Maybe we can all do some testing about how to use these terms so that their use strengthens Subud.

"The real reason for us to come together..."

I was part of a testing session in Palo Alto attended by members of our committee, regional helpers and Meldan Heaslip, chair of the Congress committee. We were looking for guidance on our Congress, and at the heart of our session was one question: "What is the purpose – the inner purpose – of this congress?" What was it that we should hope to accomplish? What areas of focus would bring most benefit to Subud members in California?

The overwhelming receiving was that this congress is to strengthen our latihan. Forget this distinction that we have made for years between business congresses and kejiwaan (spiritual) gatherings. The real reason for us to come together is to help us use this gift and put it into our daily lives. And while this is good stuff, it is also far from the real reason we come together...

THE BIRTH OF SUBUD SOUTH

Written in 1974 by Don Rollins, first Chairman of Subud South

Subud South is officially opened! For those of Subud South and other parts of the United States and the Subud world who were lucky enough to attend, it was a grand occasion. The weekend was filled with a warmth and joy that created a sense of brotherhood I had never experienced before. In attendance on this momentous occasion were brothers and sisters from Chicago, New York, Washington DC, Nashville, Houston, San Antonio, Dallas, Austin and Waco, Texas, the St. Albans group in England, Los Angeles, Albuquerque, Santa Fe, the Oklahoma City area and Skymont, not to mention several other "traveling members at large".

The congress was the culmination of several months of planning which all began when Labasir and Munawarah English arrived in Austin, Texas, "trying to find a Latihan" last November, 1973. Lusijah and I were visiting Dan Spivey in Austin for the first time, and before we knew it, we had "group" latihans and lots of enthusiasm about the future of the as yet unorganized Subud South.

Soon, members spread across Texas and Oklahoma began communicating. Latihan times were coordinated with brothers and sisters in Alabama and Tennessee. The true meaning of patience was realized as we began to think in terms of weeks instead of days, and began driving literally hundreds of miles to get together with brothers and sisters to do Latihan and partake in cultural activities. The nomadic meanderings of Labasir and Munawarah across Texas and Oklahoma for Dharma Mercantile formed a gridwork which connected those of us isolated in this

massive land like the traveling missionaries and horseback preachers did with the pioneers years ago.

Then a very unusual thing happened. I had a weeks' vacation and had been planning on a trip to the Big Bend Desert area. Labasir encouraged us to travel to Oklahoma to help Richard and Leonora Moore renovate their recently acquired home, and what was to eventually become Subud South's first Latihan hall. I must have been quite confused, because even though we had decided going to Oklahoma was the right thing to do, when it came time to set out on our vacation, we drove west to Big Bend. Even more confusing, we packed our winter coats. Well, to make a long story short, and a very long drive short, two days later we arrived in Oklahoma City, just after a snow storm, in freezing weather!

By this time we were used to the unexpected, so it came as no surprise that Labasir and Munawarah had arrived two days earlier and were already busy at work!

All at once we had a caucus, and firm plans for the congress were made. Our testing in March left no doubt that Oklahoma City would be the ideal city and that Richard and Leonore's home would be a warm and appropriate site to hold the congress, and what better date could be found than the weekend of Bapak's birthday June 21-23!

NOTE: Subsequent congress minutes recorded Don Rollins as Chairman, Lusijah Rollins as Secretary, Danton Spivey as Treasurer and noted that Subud South was no longer a dry arid place...

NATIONAL NEWS

SUBUD USA FIRST QUARTER BUDGET TO ACTUAL

First, it should be noted that compared to our budget, donations are lagging. We have been able to reduce our expenses,

but things like helper travel will pick up as the year progresses. Also, our Net Operating Income appears better than it really is because we were a little bit late in getting the \$1500 quarterly payment out to Zone 7. It does not show as paid in this report because the payment went out in April.

Secondly, on the subject of our permanent endowment funds and bequests, we received two bequests totaling \$31,543 in this reporting period. Of this amount, based on prior instructions from the board, \$10,000 was moved into the permanent general endowment, leaving \$21,543 to be allocated in some way. Daniel Stralberg (Vice-Chair) and I proposed a plan to the board on our last call on 4/14 whereby we would move \$5,000 of that money into the permanent endowment right away, and hold the balance out to be available if needed to support our day to day cash flow given the shortfall of donations we are experiencing. When put to the board for a vote, this proposed approach was unanimously passed. At the end of each quarter, we will review our situation to see if we need to draw some of it into our cash flow, or if we can move some more of it into the endowment, ideally another \$5K at the end each quarter. Although neither of the bequests gave explicit instructions as to how the money should be used, we can't help feeling that the kind souls who remembered us in their wills would dearly love to see their contributions used to build the endowment. And as for the endowments, as of 4/18, the general endowment has a balance of approximately \$123,750 and the housing endowment about \$64,000.

SUBUD USA CARE SUPPORT SERVICES

Care Support is not a new service. Subud USA has provided care support to its members for some time. Formerly, it was called the Almoners. The service provides a one-time grant of from \$100 to \$500 for a member who is having a serious financial difficulty and who has exhausted all other avenues of help. Any active Subud member is eligible to receive this aid.

If such an emergency exists, the first step is for the member to test with the local helpers about whether it is correct to apply to Care Support for financial assistance. If the member is not part of a group or center, then the regional helpers can be contacted. The helpers involved have the responsibility to talk with the member about the situation to understand all relevant facts and background; to determine if all local public and private resources have been considered; and to test whether it is appropriate to make a request for financial aid.

If the testing is positive, then

 One of the helper's who participated in the testing should complete the Care Support form. (Go to the Subud USA website – www.subudusa.org – log on to "member access", and click the link "Giving and Receiving". There, you will find information on how Care Support grants are made and a link to the PDF

- version of the form that needs to be completed.) Once filled out, it is sent to the national office.
- To speed things up, you may, in addition, contact the national office or Hamidatun Karapetian, coordinator for Care Support Services in the USA, at 866-607-4510, hamidatun1969@gmail.com, to provide information about the situation, the results of the testing, and the amount of financial aid requested.

Hamidatun will then contact one of the national helper liaisons -- Aminah Ulmer for the women and Hoan Toan Phan for the men. The national helpers will confirm through testing whether it is correct to grant the needed funds. If positive, Subud USA will issue a check to the service provider. We are not able to issue checks to individuals.

We know that these are difficult times. Unfortunately, Care Support is not able to provide on-going financial assistance for Subud members. We hope that you never encounter the circumstances that would cause you to need financial support. However, if you do, we hope you will feel comfortable contacting us. We will respond as quickly as we can.

World Congress planning is fully underway... At the Wings Meeting (in January), multiple stakeholders got together to familiarize themselves with the area and its facilities and to establish a framework for making decisions about the congress... everyone felt that this congress has unique potential as a transformative moment for Subud in the world... In this and more posts to come, I will tell you about each of the different aspects of the congress and how they developed.

The congress will be held at the convention center in downtown Puebla. There are large rooms for big latihans and plenary meetings, some smaller rooms for breakout sessions and testing, a small auditorium, and a fabulous central plaza outdoor space and an attached large, almost boardwalk-like balcony. Next to the convention center is a beautiful park...

Puebla itself is a world heritage site. Nestled among the foothills of Central Mexico with regal volcanoes watching over, Puebla is one of the capitals of Mexican culture. It is known for having a church on every corner – so many



that a person can go to a different one every day for a year without repeating. The central square, "el Zocalo," is a plaza (with free Wi-Fi, by the way) that basks in the splendor of the main cathedral, built by the Spaniards in the 1600s.

There are pedestrian streets lined with colorful shops and cheap, delicious food on every corner. Ever had grilled cactus flower? There are vintage consignment shops, ceramic studios, luxury movie theaters, and plazas where Mariachi bands play as you enjoy your lunch. A busy city, Puebla is alive at all hours, and as a young, single woman, I can tell you from my own experience – having visited Puebla two times now! – that it is absolutely safe and quiet even for people alone out at night. SUBUD CUBA LEGAL AFTER 55 YEARS

Marini Annet Gil Aneiros, SD Cuba Representative, sent this e-mail:

To all my Subud brothers and sisters in the world:
Today is very special because today, the 14th of
February, the day of love and friendship, we inform you
that at 2:50 pm Cuban time we received the news that
Subud Cuba has been legalized! We the members and
council of Subud Cuba: Asis, Marini, Munirah,
Sjariffudin and Lucas, Council Representatives, want to
share this happiness. Almighty God is with us.
Thousands of kisses and congratulations! We are very,
very happy! For us it is important that the world knows
that Subud has been legalized!!

And Asis Alán Borges Riego, Cuba National Chair writes (as translated by Zone 7 Council Cuba Liaison, Alejandra Martinez)

As you know, Subud Cuba was legalized on February 14, with advantages and responsibilities.

According to the law in our country, Subud is classified as a religious organization, as our first fundamental objective is the worship of God. That's the first criteria in the process of registration of brotherhoods and religions by the Justice Ministry of Cuba. Included in this group are all the religions: Christian, Muslims, yoga, Masons, etc.

As National Chair of Subud Cuba, I have already been invited to a meeting with about 100 others from different churches and also with senior representatives of the government. In attendance were the President of the National Assembly and representatives of the Communist Party of Cuba (PCC) that is responsible for all of the religious organizations.

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR SUBUD CUBA?

Alejandra explains:

- Subud representatives can go to Cuba without problems as long as Subud Cuba informs the government religious representative;
- Subud Cuba can organize congresses and meetings;
- Members of the National Committee can participate in international events:
- Subud Cuba can buy a room to do latihan;
- Subud Cuba can rent facilities to celebrate any international event. To do that Subud Cuba needs to do the paperwork one year before, to avoid coinciding with another religious event;
- If an International event is held in Cuba, Subud needs to have a permit from the Justice Ministry to facilitate the paperwork and visas of the persons who will enter the country.
- Subud Cuba can continue all their projects and receive donations with total autonomy. Also Subud will be able to receive help from the State, if necessary

Asis writes: Maybe for a lot of members who are used to all of these advantages, this is not that important, but for us after 55 years this legalization is phenomenal.

CONNECTING WITH CUBA

from Dave Hitchcock, Zone 7 Representative, excerpted from the April WSA e-News,

A major disappointment for me since becoming Zone 7 Representative at the Christchurch World Congress in 2010 has been the difficulty in communication between Subud Cuba and the Zone. I do not speak Spanish and most of the Subud Cuba national committee, including their Chair Asis Borges Riego, does not speak English. Then in 2012 Alejandra Martinez became Committee Councillor for Subud Canada and, consequently, a member of the Zone 7 Council. Alejandra lives in Ottawa, but is from Colombia and is fluent in both Spanish and English. Since last fall her incredible enthusiasm has meant renewed contact between Zone 7 and Subud Cuba, both by email and telephone. Thank you Alejandra!

As a result, the Zone Council was able to identify how we could best support Subud Cuba, as a member of the Zone 7 family, and in the past nine months has focused on this task. A small Subud Cuba Support Group was established, comprising the Committee Councillors from the Zone, together with Zone Treasurer, Hardwin Blanchard. A large

part of this support involves providing financial assistance to Subud Cuba to help:

- The National Helpers and Committee to travel around Cuba
- Provide for a National Congress in 2014
- Printing costs for Cuba's national publication, "Alborada"
- Printing Spanish copies of Bapak's and Ibu Rahayu's talks
- Travel and other costs for Cuban delegates to attend the 2014 World Congress

Efforts were made for delegates from Subud Cuba to travel to the Zone 7 Council meeting in Albuquerque, U.S. in July of this year. However, it became increasingly clear that the process of Cubans obtaining the necessary visas, even if it were successful, could take a year or more! Therefore, the Council decided to focus its efforts on helping delegates from Cuba attend the World Congress in Mexico.

SUBUD CUBA AND HURRICANE SANDY

Alejandra Martinez , excerpted from SCAN, the Subud Canada Newsletter:

Last fall, Cuba was hit by Hurricane Sandy. It did a lot of damage. Cubans asked for humanitarian help, and Susila Dharma International gave \$6000 from its Emergency Fund. With it, the Cuban National Committee made sure that all the 150 Subud members received a small amount for basic needs such as food and medication. Another priority of the National Committee was to visit the different communities where there are members so they can meet with them.

During the visit to Manzanillo, the committee was able to bring materials for a project that offers workshops for disabled people. The materials were bought with support from Susila Dharma Canada. ...The last purpose of these donations was to help an elementary school in Santiago de Cuba. That school was in very bad condition and joyfully, the donations allowed the school to be reequipped with materials lost or destroyed in the flood. The collaboration was very successful!

SURINAME ERRATUM: An article about Subud Suriname's 45th Anniversary Celebration was included in the last issue of Subud USA news. We'd like to add that Suriname switched from Zone 8 (Latin America) to Zone 7 (North America) in 2005 with approval from the Innsbruck World Congress, in part from greater language facility.

INTERNATIONAL and SUBUD USA ARCHIVES UPDATE

from Daniela Moneta, Subud USA Archivist, dmoneta@cox.net, Read her complete report.

With the news of Bapak's passing in 1987, I had the opportunity to go to Indonesia for four years to work in Bapak's Archives. While there we organized, preserved, and microfilmed his collection of over a quarter million papers. Bapak was very good about seeing that the history of Subud was collected. We have a few papers going back to when Bapak was a young man and a number of important documents about Subud before it began to spread to other countries; reports, correspondence with members, travel data about his world tours, all have been saved by Bapak.

Bapak suggested that we have five international archives centers in various parts of the world. Since 1990, our U.S. international archives were in Los Angeles. The core of the collection was the 100 plus rolls of microfilm of Bapak's archives at Wisma Subud. It was stored in a climate controlled facility at Iron Mountain, Los Angeles.

Many years before that, Ruth Jahoda, a Florida Subud member and professional librarian, had been collecting Subud archives for the U.S., as well as Subud material from other countries. This included early newsletters, reports, journals, books, and memoires mainly showing how Subud started in the U.S. Just before Ruth's passing, she transferred many boxes of material to me in Phoenix sometime around 2005. This material has been stored in the Iron Mountain facility in Phoenix. Subud USA pays a monthly fee to have our archives stored. The collection has grown over the years. Subud Los Angeles eventually transferred their materials to Phoenix so I now care for the national and international archives. I made many important discoveries. Several of the boxes from Subud Los Angeles contained the papers of the first Subud member in the U.S., Earl Robinson, dating back to 1951.

Sometime last year, the head of the Subud International Archives (a sub-committee of the World Subud Association), Armand Bisson, asked the five international archivists - from England, U.S., Australia, Japan, and Indonesia - to make a computer index of what we have in our collections and to produce a procedures manual and collection policy. We are in the process of doing this now. We hope to have a working draft ready for the next World Congress in Mexico in 2014.

Having a database of what we already have will give us a good handle on what is missing; what parts of our Subud history need more coverage, what documents are out there in private hands that should be in the archives. If we don't write the procedures manual and the collection policy now, many important papers will be lost. As older members pass on, their papers may be discarded by family who are not in Subud or even by younger Subud members who do not know about the archives.

PRESERVING BAPAK'S LEGACY – THE LEGACY PROJECT Bachtiar Lorot, MSF Chairman and Trustee, writes in the latest WSA e-Newsletter: "The Muhammad Subuh Foundation signed an agreement with WSA for the preservation and restoration of the audio recordings of Bapak's talks on behalf of WSA. A few days later, MSF signed a contract with Memnon, a Belgium company which had been carefully selected by Amalijah Thompson who was then WSA archives coordinator. The digitization of the audio recordings began in April 2012 under the technical supervision of Amalijah as MSF's and WSA's archive advisor. The project has been a big success.

In the January issue of the MSF e-News Rayner Sutherland, MSF Executive Director, writes "Preserving Bapak's voice for future generations to hear, and to do this work in a professional way and to archival standards, is an important responsibility for this generation of Subud members to properly fulfill. But, this is only part of what is being done. Bapak's videos, photographs, key documents and other material that provide the context and further evidence and proof of Bapak's presence and of the early days of Subud as well as Ibu Rahayu's talks and videos will also be preserved to professional archival standards.

MSF continues to cooperate and collaborate with the World Subud Association and together the two organizations have recently embarked on a joint fundraising drive. MSF's fundraising drive is called the *Legacy Project* and seeks to raise One Million USD over the next ten years to support the needs of the WSA International Archives over this period. The Muhammad Subuh Foundation pre-funded this project from its capital holdings (\$210,000 in 2012 and a commitment of \$60,000

for 2013) to ensure that the preservation and restoration of Bapak's audio tapes could begin right away. There was an urgent need to begin immediately, before deterioration of the early audiotapes caused them to be lost forever. Fortunately, Memnon has been able to actually restore most of those deteriorated tapes."

Amalijah Thompson, WSA Archive Consultant, Reports:

"At the end of January a major milestone was completed – the three month, very focused quality assessment needed on each new digital file [of Bapak's talks] to ensure the analogue to digital conversion had been done correctly to archival standards. Of the 2,178 files possible to create from those original analogue recordings the outcome statistics were:

- 10% (220 tape sides) not able to be digitized or needing intervention to enable digitization with unknown result because of tape deterioration/issues
- 11.5% referred back for minor adjustment or checking by Memnon
- 0.18% (4 tape sides) needing re-digitization from the original recording
- 78% files (tape sides) checked out OK

During the quality assessment stage, I engaged an archival sound engineer I've worked with over a number of years to assist with the technical 'listening' needed over what was quite a massive task to check over 2500 hours of recordings within a very short time frame. Tony's lovely comment before Christmas when we took a much needed break: "There are many fine recordings of Bapak through the collection. Good analogue tape recordings can be amazingly transparent, the natural warmth and timbre of the human voice can be so perfectly captured by tape... It's like being transported back into the ambience of the room - a very, very cool experience."



This morning, Oswald said, she got up as usual, put on her glasses, turned on the TV...and passed on peacefully. She was 85. The Lakes have been together since they were high school sweethearts. They are very, very longtime Subud members and Asa was always full of her upbeat Subud stories and laughing. Such a long Subud history she had.

from Latifah Taormina on Asa: Here is something Asa sent to me in 1999 about Subud. I treasure this: 1959 was the year of our opening. The room was filled with hundreds of people screaming, crying and moaning after a "begin" was said by a little foreign woman I could barely see in the front of a huge room in Alhambra, California. We had driven all the way from Santa Monica after a 3 month probation in this mysterious group called SUBUD. After this experience we stood on the sidewalk outside the building and compared notes. What did you feel? None of us knew much about what had happened in the latihan, but we knew we felt wonderful! SO with that began our years in Subud.

Our little world was expendable to include all manner of interesting and odd brothers and sisters who suddenly became important to us. Oswald was almost immediately on the committee and I naturally came along. We never had marvelous "spiritual experiences" or "crisis" - but we always felt fresh and new and wonderful after latihan.

We read everything we could find and did our latihan and work in the world - and knew almost nothing until 1963. That was the year of the World Congress in New York. There we came to know Bapak ...and that's where Bapak did "testing" in the group in front of everyone. The testing gave us a deeper experience of the latihan and meeting with the brothers and sisters from around the world gave us a happier feeling about "the brotherhood" then we could have from just knowing the group in California. I think of these as rich, fulfilling years... our children grew, we grew... We started SNA (Subud North America), the precursor to Subud USA, and our lives and hearts expanded to hold more and more.

There were always a thousand levels of everything. Heaven and Hell were always combining and intertwining and the fruits of the latihan seemed to always be there to save us from falling into the Magnetism of any one of these levels to the detriment of embracing the present.

God is Good! It was a grand beginning and a gift from heaven. Time hardly seems to have passed, yet here it is, 1999, and here we still are - Oswald and Asa, married 52 years this June, have 5 grandchildren, still doing the latihan...and doing nothing spectacular in our lives. I had expected at least WINGS by this time - or to have experienced the Cosmos personally! But, I was one destined to be ordinary... of late, I remember Bapak saying that's what we SHOULD be, and as the world gets more and more crazy with each passing day, I have learned to treasure my ordinary-ness as the "pearl of great price". I believe that it is important to do latihan for reasons far beyond ourselves and beyond our understanding. It's as if we form a bridge for the latihan energy to penetrate this level, and this is important for the Earth itself - and our duty to Almighty God in response to the constant blessings with which he fills our lives. When all other reasons fail, we keep on doing latihan because it is the only choice we have.

from Rasjidah Franklin: I just did latihan for Asa ...what an amazing understanding of what it means to do latihan for someone else.... I needed to know again, to be reminded. A final gift from Asa.

I knew Asa in several different contexts: social, political, through our years together in Subud, and through her family. We argued politics for many years and finally found that our ideas came full circle and met.... Her humor, often self-deprecating, is legendary. I can hear her joyous laughter as I write this, and remember her saying that Bapak said that laughter brings the angels. It was Asa's nature to laugh, so she must have many angels helping her on her way.

Asa was a pillar of the early Subud community in California. She, along with Rosina Filippelli, Irene James and a few others, will always be my examples of Subud women who managed to be both in the world and to touch what is beyond. God speed to Asa and may she be blessed in the next life.

from Louise Lumen and Rohana Alkaitis: Elmira Ingersoll, our beloved sister, died peacefully in her sleep on



Wednesday, February 6, at home, 2 months short of her 103rd Birthday. Louise had been in latihan with her in the days prior to her passing.

A family person extraordinaire - she gave birth to 4

children, who produced 12 grandchildren and untold numbers of great-grands - all birthdays remembered and celebrated in her imaginative ways.

Elmira was opened in New York in 1959 and because she had such an active, dancing latihan, she was asked to be a helper that day. She agreed, not having a clue what that meant.

She and a few others started the group in Long Island and was an active part of it for 29 years until she moved. When Bapak and Family made a visit to NY she hosted them at her home in Huntington.

In 1986, she and Mary Muhlhausen, both widowed and close Subud Sisters, bought a lakeside property together in Lyme, Connecticut. Their home, which they later named Harmony House soon became a center for Subud Connecticut, and for groups involved in peace movements; growth and healing groups; groups with environmental concerns, creative activities, etc. They were both peace activists, artists and world travelers; included in their travels were many of the Subud World Congresses.

Mary died 3 years ago (at 102 1/2 yrs) - Elmira continued to make the house available for gatherings of all kinds, but gradually was less able to be an active participant.

Elmira's mind was extraordinarily sharp to the end - she remembered dates and events, people and places that were simply unbelievable. She was so very devoted to

the latihan and always felt it - "like the movement of an inner pendulum" she would say.

Elmira's life and her commitment to the latihan for 53 years touched so many of us in Subud through the years. Her family will have a 'Celebration of Elmira's Life" at a later date.

From Sharifa Benepe: Elmira and Mary Mulhausen hosted ongoing Subud gatherings and latihans from the time they bought their property in the early 80's... Local members have been doing latihan there regularly ever since. Elmira was totally alert until the very end, always interested in so many things... She loved being read to, recommending and giving books to everyone who came to see her. A very grand lady indeed! We shall all miss her presence in our lives

from Lola Stone: Elmira was opened by the Weeks and was my close friend and Subud sister for almost sixty years. Because she was soon made a helper, several of us were opened shortly afterwards during Bapak's first New York visit. The Long Island Group was then formed and active.

Through Elmira I met all these fascinating folks such as the famous psychic, Olga Worrell and other clairvoyants, who although I never would have gone to consult; nevertheless, told me things that came true.

Because of her son John, who left this world quite early, I was recommended to the Quakers (The Friends) to represent the Women of America in a group of four, "The Committee for Non Violent Action", to visit several European countries and meet with members of their Parliaments to petition for an end of nuclear testing. She was always an important part of my life.

from Melinda Wallis: Elmira was a very staunch supporter of Subud financially, as well as all other ways! Elmira and Mary were "salt of the earth" responders to special appeals for help from Subud USA.

HARYANTO TRUONG

from Hoan Toan Phan: Haryanto was 65 years old, passed away early on the morning of March 20, 2013. Haryanto was introduced to Subud by me and opened in 1971 in Saigon, Vietnam. He was a Subud Vietnam librarian from 1972-1974. He became a helper in Viet Nam in 1975 on the same day as Hoan Toan. He was a former National Helper of Subud USA from 1984-1991 at the same time as Hoan Toan as well. He was an active helper in the Chicago group from 1991 -2010. He became an inactive helper in 2010 due to illness. He was gentle, lovely, and had strong faith in God. He was very active in Subud for the 42 years after his opening. He was one of Hoan Toan's closest brothers in Subud. Survivors are his wife, Susilawati Truong, and four children - 3 boys (19, 21,22) and one girl (10).

from Hadrian Pollard: Having lived in Chicago for less than a year, my interactions with Haryanto were limited. But the small moments that I did get to spend with him were meaningful and will forever remain in a special place in my heart.

Haryanto was always in high spirits, he would greet me with a warm smile whenever I came to latihan. But he was also quiet. This wasn't in a shy sort of a way, but more in a "ask-me-and-then-I'll-tell" sort of a way. So one morning after latihan, I did. I asked Haryanto about his life and Vietnam and his family. He and his brother, Suharto, told me amazing and harrowing stories of communist Vietnam - the fear they experienced, the hardships, and the destruction. They detailed their narrow escape from the country, just barely fleeing the airport as it was showered with bombs. I was horrified and enthralled.

Haryanto began teaching me basic Vietnamese phrases. It was our way of bonding with one another. Whenever I saw him I would shout, "Khỏe không (How are you)?" He would laughingly correct my pronunciation. I never seemed to say it quite right the first time. When he was satisfied with my feeble attempt at the Vietnamese greeting, he would respond, "Toi khoẻ (I am fine)."

When I found out that Haryanto had cancer, I was nervous to see him again. I didn't know what to say or how to act. But the first time that I saw him after the news, he was mostly the same. I could tell that he was

weaker, but the familiar lightness still emanated from him - he was still warm. I greeted him as I always had. He smiled and corrected me before saying that he was khoė.

Haryanto's visits to the latihan hall became less and less frequent. After a few months, he stopped coming altogether. Suharto told us that he was going through his treatments and needed rest. A few weeks before his passing, Haryanto's wife walked his fragile body down the steps and into the latihan hall. I could feel his presence, but it was getting dimmer. He had to sit for almost the entire latihan. Afterwards, I sat next to him as we both struggled to put on our shoes. I took a deep breath, looked him in the eyes, and asked, "Khôe không?" He slightly lifted the corners of his lips. "I am tired," he said. His wife then lifted him by the arm and slowly walked him to the door. That was the last time I saw Haryanto.

In the end, Haryanto knew that it was his time to go. Though his body was failing him, his spirit remained the warm and loving person that we all knew Haryanto to be.

RAHMANIYAH BOWDEN

THE PASSING OF A PIONEER, see photo album

from Subud World News: It is with sorrow that we share the news that Rahmaniyah Bowden, who recently celebrated her 95th birthday, passed away on April 18, 2013, in Brighton, UK. She was surrounded by her family.

Born Countess Ilona Edelsheim Gyulai, Rahmaniyah married Istvan Horthy, the vice-regent of Hungary, when she was 21. Her husband, an outspoken critic of the Nazis, died in an extremely suspicious plane crash; and when the Nazis invaded Hungary, Ilona, her small son, her father-in-law and his wife were arrested and imprisoned in Germany. After the war, Rahmaniyah's life moved between Portugal, England and Iraq. In 1958, through her son Sharif, she joined Subud.

Rahmaniyah was among the first International Helpers chosen by Bapak at the beginning of the eighties. At the time, the task took the IHs all over the world, wherever they were needed. Rahmaniyah stood down from the function at the World Congress in Sydney, in 1989; but her commitment to Subud and the Latihan has never waned and she was present at many national, zonal and international gatherings and meetings. Another great

achievement was the writing of her autobiography, 'Honour and Duty'.

Rahmaniyah will be greatly missed and lovingly remembered. May God grant her further grace in the life beyond.

from Leo Horthy: My grandmother's, Rahmaniyah Bowden's, spirit left this earth last night at the age of 95. This was all very sudden and unexpected as she had been well. In the last email I got from her a few weeks ago, she said the hip she broke last year had miraculously healed and she could walk again.

She stay engaged until the end and when I last saw her in November she had just returned from Budapest where she was interviewed for Hungarian TV setting the record straight for her father-in-law, laying out the historical facts as she had recorded them in her diaries from all those years ago.

She never gave up, and pushed herself harder that anyone else I have known. If there was one thing that she could still do, she did it and she was selfless until the end. SOURCE OF LIFE, by Léonard Lassalle; review by Hanafi Fraval


Ever wondered about what surrender really is? Ever thought about how powerful, if you were able routinely to be in a state of surrender, that can be as an agent for change in your life? Did you ever wonder what Bapak *really* meant by putting the latihan into practice?

A new book, *Source of Life*, by Léonard Lassalle is literally the best Subud book I have read. And there are several other very good books out there. I'm the book guy at the Los Angeles group. 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
