Managing Problem Behavior and The Essential Eight Skills

JOIN US on Friday, August 30th! The Essential Eight are skills which are essential for a happy, fulfilling and productive life. In the absence of these skills, children and adults are less likely to learn other skills, more likely to exhibit forms of problem behavior and less likely to have contact and interaction with the community in which they live. If learners exhibit problem behavior when exposed to specific situation, instructors, parents and care providers tend to avoid these situations in the future, and as a result, avoid the problem behavior. Failure to tolerate these situations restricts the places a learner can go, the items a learner can access, the activities in which the learner can participate and the people with whom a learner can interact. Tony A. Fry, M.A., BCBA will teach workshop participants function-based teaching protocols which include procedures designed to teach The Essential Eight Skills and decrease the frequency of problem behaviors that tend to occur in their absence. If you are working with children or adults with disabilities who exhibit one or more problem behaviors and do not exhibit The Essential Eight Skills: (1) making requests; (2) waiting; (3) accepting removals, making transitions, sharing, and taking turns; (4) following instructions to complete previously acquired tasks; (5) accepting "no"; (6) following directions related to health and safety; (7) completing daily living skills related to health and safety; (8) tolerating situations related to health and safety...this workshop is for YOU!

2013 Legislative Wrap-Up

In many ways the 2013 Legislative Session was a huge success for individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. Legislators heard the voices of advocates and responded. Some highlights of legislative action included funding for additional New Opportunity Waiver slots, increased funding for the Individual and Family Support Program and Families Helping Families Centers, restoration of funding for Children's Special Health Services Clinics that were slated for closure, rejection of proposed changes to the education funding formula and blockage of a proposal to create private segregated schools for children with disabilities.

Jessica Autin, Region 9 LaCAN Leader, would like to thank all who helped advocate for home and community based services during the 2013 Legislative Session. Our region held 2 roundtables which were attended by 57 LaCAN members and 5 legislators. 30 regional members joined hundreds of others from across the state at the Capitol in Baton Rouge for the 2013 Disability Rights Rally. 10 members attended yellow shirt days and several provided testimony before legislative committees. Members communicated the importance of home and community based services to their legislators and over 200 action alert confirmations were tallied from Region 9 alone. Thank you! YOU advocated and it worked!

Unfortunately, on June 21st Governor Jindal line item vetoed all of the funding for home and community based services listed above as well as funding for Louisiana Assistive Technology Access Network (LATAN). A parent led grassroots advocacy group formed, Override the Veto Louisiana (OTVLA), and diligently worked for 3 weeks to ask legislators to support Louisiana's first override veto session. On July 12th the votes were tallied and, although a majority of legislators voted to support the special session, the needed votes from each side of the legislature were not there. In addition to the line item vetoes, the Department of Health and Hospitals (DHH) announced additional cuts of \$25.9 million in State General Funds. Read the DHH Announcement of the cuts here.

NFHF is **Making** a **Difference**

My name is Cindy Cruse and I have a son with Asperger's syndrome. My son's name is Matthew and he is 23 years old. Matthew and I were first introduced to Northshore Families Helping Families in February 2012. The Office of Citizens with Disabilities forwarded Matthew's information to NFHF and we were contacted by them within one week's time. NFHF sent us information on programs and activities that were available to us. It was like a light had suddenly been turned on. There were things that Matthew could actually participate in (which was a drastic change from his high school days).

Our first interaction with NFHF was a Mardi Gras Ball that was held in February 2012. Matthew met other young adults with disabilities as well as their family members and workers. What a great day!!

I was truly amazed. Just like that, our lives had changed forever. Before the inclusion into this group, our world was very small and we felt so alone. Now, our world has grown and Matthew has blossomed. He has made friends, tried new things (without the fear of rejection or failure), and feels that he has a place in this world after all.

We have participated in functions that have been set up through NFHF (i.e. bowling, autism awareness walks, social skills classes, support groups, holiday parties and more).

When I reflect on the big picture, it scares me to think what today would be like if NFHF was not part of our lives. Matthew would still be alone, withdrawn, and depressed. I would still feel helpless, lost, and overwhelmed. This organization is vital to so many. I see the difference it makes in our lives and witness the positive results for others as well. So in closing, I'd like to say "thank you" for this organization and all that it represents.

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Northshore Families Helping Families became my mediator for an aggressive, nightmarish IEP. FHF organizations are so needed and in enormous demand to provide knowledge and guidance to parents of children with disabilities that are in school. I was referred to NFHF by the school IEP team of educators in 2011.

IEP meetings had become so stressful and battlefield like, that without NFHF advocates, the stress would have caused harm and devastation to my family. The stress was so near to putting me into a nervous breakdown adding extreme and unnecessary stress on top of the daily stress from providing for a child with special needs and sole provider of a terminally ill mother. NFHF has provided me with resources to gain knowledge of my child's individual rights in support of equality in disabilities. If NFHF were to become non-existent, my family's quality of life will be at jeopardy. There will be no one in Tangipahoa/Northshore area to educate and advocate for families and individuals with disabilities not only in the education industries but also in the employment.

# **Children's Special Health Services (CSHS)**

Children's Special Health Services (CSHS) is a public agency that ensures children and youth who have special health care needs in Louisiana have access to health care services designed to minimize their disabilities and maximize their probabilities of enjoying independent and self-sufficient lives. Children and youth who have special health care needs are those who have or are at increased risk for a chronic physical, developmental or emotional condition and who also require health and related services of a type or amount beyond what most children or youth require.

Each Children's Special Health Service Clinic has a Parent Liaison. Parent Liaisons are responsible for assisting parents in accessing services, providing emotional support, information and referral to both family members and professionals, facilitation of parent and professional collaboration, outreach and assistance in completing necessary documentation of clinic services. CSHS Parent Liaisons receive specialized training and have the knowledge and skills to work with other parents with children and youth with special health care needs.

Learn what CSHS means to a family:

My son, Robert has been going to clinic in Hammond, where we live, for many years to see the ophthalmologist and neurologist. Robert is unable to participate in a regular eye exam, so having a pediatric specialist come to Hammond has been helpful. Most of Robert's doctors are pediatric specialists at Children's Hospital, so I have to take him to New Orleans 8 to 10 time a year for his appointments.

Robert's pediatrician here in town has told me that it's better for Robert to see doctors that have experience working with children with disabilities. So many of Robert's medical conditions are interrelated. The specialists at CSHS have this experience. It has been so helpful not to have to travel an extra 2 or 3 times a year to New Orleans or Baton Rouge. Each round trip takes a minimum of 4 hours.

I understand that some of the children are coming as far away as Bogalusa to see the doctors at CSHS. I'm concerned that some parents would have a very difficult time traveling to places like New Orleans from the more rural areas of the state. I think that it's possible that some parents might bypass important appointments due to travel hardships. If they do make appointments with their local doctors, I can say that there's a greater chance that the doctor might miss a key element in making a correct diagnosis for a child with a complicated medical history.

CSHS clinics are vital to our community and it's crucial that funding remain available to continue support to our most fragile children. Families whose children with significant disabilities are on Medicaid or have no insurance need access to CSHS specialists in some form or fashion that doesn't require long and burdensome trips.

An Invitation to Apply – The Louisiana Developmental Disabilities Council annually seeks applications from motivated, interested individuals who have developmental disabilities or parents of children with developmental disabilities, to become candidates for Partners in Policymaking. ### Managed care Could be Coming for Individuals with Developmental Disability Waivers

The state is currently investigating the feasibility of instituting managed care for waiver services in Louisiana. Last November, DHH issued a "Request for Information" (RFI) for ideas on what a managed-care program for long-term care (including developmental disability waiver) services would look like. The state received 16 responses. Most were from large agencies. Some provided these managed care services in other states. Some did not. Many who heard of the RFI were concerned that NOW waiver services would be moved into managed care immediately, but in our discussions with Dr. Laura Brackin, Assistant Secretary for the Office of Citizens with Developmental Disabilities (OCDD) and Kathy Kliebert, Deputy Secretary for the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals (DHH), we were assured this process will involve extensive consideration and stakeholder input if the state decides to move toward managed care. Kathy Kliebert also indicated that there is no possibility of a move to managed care for waiver services this fiscal year (beginning July 1, 2013) and that the state had not even made any decisions on whether or not to move forward at the time of this writing.

The key thing to remember is whether or not the state moves to managed care for long-term supports and services, no one will truly know what that will mean until after the stakeholder input and a Request for Proposals is issued. The possibilities are many if they decide to move forward. A wide variety of services could be included, including institutional care, home and community based care, health care and/or mental health care.

The Louisiana Family to Family Health Information Center has taken an active collaborative approach to working with state officials and other agencies so that families are represented in the stakeholder process. Online trainings are being held now for families on managed care and how it works so that we can be fully-participating members of the stakeholder groups involved. We will schedule additional webinars as stakeholder meetings are held to update families on the progress of the meetings and where we stand. ### Louisiana Assistive Technology Access Network

#### **Device Demonstration Program**

What is an Assistive Technology (AT) Device? An AT device is best described as any item, piece of equipment or product system which is used to increase, maintain or improve the functional capability of an individual living with a disability.

Who benefits from the AT Demonstration Program? Individuals of all ages with all types of disabilities who need assistance in the life skills areas of communication, mobility, vision, hearing, education, recreation, vocation, employment and community living as well as caregivers, educators, employers, business owners and rehabilitation organizations.

To better serve individuals with disabilities, LATAN has established an Assistive Technology Device Demonstration Program in Louisiana. The AT Demonstration Program, with centers currently located in Baton Rouge and Shreveport, offers consumers the opportunity to experience AT devices firsthand and to make informed decisions as to what type of equipment will best suite their specific needs. The Device Demonstration Program provides, for a fee, "traveling demonstrations" to other parts of the state for those who cannot access the equipment in the centers.

LATAN invites you to make an appointment to stop by either center location to experience tools and devices to aid in community loving, employment and school, or call LATAN to find out when demonstrations will be in your area.

#### **Device Loan Program**

LATAN also offers residents of Louisiana with disabilities the opportunity to borrow a variety of Assistive Technology equipment and devices for temporary use prior to making a purchase, while a device is being repaired, while waiting for new equipment to be delivered or as a short-term accommodation. AT available for loan includes devices for vision, hearing, speech, computer access, environmental control and switch access, daily living, mobility, seating and positioning, learning, cognitive and developmental support.

Who is eligible to borrow? Individuals with any type of disability, functional limitation or age-related issue who are Louisiana citizens; agencies and organizations that work with individuals with any type of disability or limitation; and employers of people with disabilities, to help them determine what AT will work best on the job.

What is the length of time for the loan? An individual may borrow AT devices from LATAN for a period of 35 days. This period includes the day it leaves LATAN to the day it is returned to LATAN.

Are there any fees? Yes. Fees are dependent upon the value of the device and include costs associated with technical assistance during the Device Loan period.

#### AT Financial Loan Program

LATAN's Assistive Technology Financial Loan Program assists people with disabilities in purchasing assistive technology through a special loan program. The reduced-interest, fixed-rate, extended-term loan program provides a worthwhile option in the funding maze facing consumers who need to purchase assistive technology to improve or maintain their level of independence, to increase or maintain their productivity or to improve their quality of life.

An individual may borrow from \$500 - \$50,000. The length of the loan depends upon the life expectancy of the equipment and demonstrated ability to repay the debt. The rate of the reduced-interest loan depends on the prime rate.

LATAN's AT Financial Loan Program is designed to assist persons who may not qualify under traditional loan programs. All sources will be considered the same as employment income.

Assitive Technology may include, but is not limited to: vehicle modification; new or used vehicles to be modified; computers and adaptations; mobility devices (wheelchairs, scooters and prostheses); home modification; augmentative communication devices; hearing aids; environmental control units; vision aids; any service to support AT device; any other item or device that improves or maintains the independence of a person.
