My name is Janice Weichman, and I am a member of the Wilson Mill Park Planning Committee, an ad hoc Committee of the Bedford Selectmen formed under the guidance of Gordon Feltman in 2003...with the mission to protect, foster and advocate for this historic mill site and surrounding natural habitat.

I would like to thank all the current and past members of the Wilson Mill Park Planning Committee who met the first Wednesday of every month for ten years. Dorothy Africa, Philippe Kelty, Tom Pinney, Mike Rosenberg, our Selectmen liaison, and Art Ellis, our liaison from the Historic Preservation Commission. Former members of the Wilson Mill Committee have included Neil Leary, Myles McDonough, Karl Winkler, Lee Yates, Bob Slechta, and Brian Bartkus.

I like to refer to our group as "the little Committee that could." At times over the past ten years, our work progressed like a chapter out of Lemony Snicket's A Series of Unfortunate Events. My personal low point came after we had met all the necessary ConCom requirements, had successfully bid out the Park beautification job, and the contractor began putting protective hay bales in place to begin work...when a large sink hole was discovered on the bridge and the dam was later condemned by the state...bringing our Park restoration efforts to a screeching halt. That was back in 2007. But, we kept the faith! We persevered with the help of many Town Departments and Committees.

We would like to thank both Rich Warrington and Adrienne St. John and their team at the Department of Public Works...with a special shout-out to Kristin Dowdy and Matthew Shuman... for their hard work in bringing this project to completion. People from the neighborhood bring their children to visit the pond, others stroll or walk their dogs, bicyclists commute through the park, lunch time joggers from businesses down the road move in packs over the bridge. On weekends, serious bikers and hikers fill the parking lot to access the back woods. And, in winter, if all conditions are right...then there is ice skating...not just any skating, but magical Currier & Ives skating.
